PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2014

What a year it's been for Mosman Rugby! Many great traditions have been kept up, and some new ones started.

If you're new to Mosman rugby, take the time to read this report. If you're in the U6s or U7s or just started playing summer touch or with the girls on a Tuesday night, this report will give you some insight into the myriad of fantastic sections and activities we have across all ages, and what's in store in the many years at Mosman Junior Rugby Club we hope you all have ahead of you.



This year we finally realised what has been a dream and aspiration for many at the club for many years. We refurbished Rawson Clubhouse and The Whalehouse was born, being opened by the Hon. Gillian Skinner, MP and the Mayor of Mosman, Peter Abelson, in August this year. We also contributed to the upgrade of the pitch at Rawson Oval, which means that the Club now use it for Friday night and Sunday morning Juniors (U10 -U16s) and Saturday morning Minis (U6 – U9s).

Additionally we now have use of Rawson Oval in the summer and have kicked off a Summer Non-Contact Sevens Tournament - the first of its kind in Sydney. The Girls on a Tuesday night also had a record year.

The Juniors (U10 – U16) had a strong season. The U10E Sharks, U12F Dolphins, U14D Dolphins and U15C Whales all won their Grand Finals. It is the most Grand Final winners we have had for a number of years. We also formed Joint Venture teams in the U13s and U16s, working particularly well in this age group.

Our season again kicked off with the Libbo Cup in which we narrowly lost by 1 game to Newport. This tradition looks like a firm fixture on the calendar, and now with increased access to Rawson Oval, we will hopefully be able to host some pre-season competitions of our own.



From U10 upwards, we are a part of Norths District (along with Hunters Hill, Norths and Drummoyne) and we again had numerous representatives from Mosman in the NSW State Championships that take place over the Queens Birthday Holiday weekend every year. For the third year in a row, the Norths U15 team became State Champions. Congratulations to Ed Collard, Luke Edwards, Hamish Southwell and Mac Williams. Luke also went on to represent NSW.

The U12's had another successful Barracudas (Cudas) tour to the South Island of New Zealand, with increased numbers. Also, our U15s toured Samoa at Easter for the fourth year in a row. Having had the most incredible trip to NZ with Cudas a few years ago, I can confirm that Samoa is yet more incredible, with a great time being had by our 15 year-old boys as they become men in Whalehouse.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT 2014



Registration Day for 2014 occurred again at the offices of our Platinum Sponsor, LJ Hooker at LJ Hooker House in Mosman. Thank you again to Richard Harding and Geoff Smith and their team for assisting in the set up and having the venue available for us each year to launch the Rugby season.

In attendance to assist was one of our other loyal and committed sponsors, Adrian Hondros on behalf of Commonwealth Bank Private, who again this year stayed for the duration of the morning and signed our new and renewing players up to the Mosman Junior Rugby Club (MJRC).

Our new Minis Co-ordinator, Grant Whatley and our U9 Age Group Co-ordinator (AGC), Bindi Codrington, were also on hand assisting in the registration process, along with other valued supporters of the club.

Thank you to Russell from Olympus Sports, and Nathan from Australian Sports Apparel who both attended, introducing themselves and providing gear and assistance to our 2014 players.

Following the MJRC Registration Day, the online registration period was this year restricted to provide a deadline for the registrations enabling the team allocations for the Minis (U6-U9) and the grading process for the U10-U16 age groups to commence in a timely manner. As the club has evolved and grown to often over 700 registrations, the online registration process will be encouraged to be the preferred means of registration, with an aim of 90-100% online in 2015, and the registration period will again be restricted to a strict deadline.

Table [1] shows the breakdown for the 2013 MJRC registrations by Age group:

698 players registered for the 2014 season ensuring that Mosman remained the largest junior rugby club in New South Wales. This reflects the strength of the Mosman Junior Rugby Club in the Sydney Junior Rugby Union competition and the reputation as the largest rugby club in Sydney and NSW. Mosman fielded 40 teams across the various age groups that also included four Joint Venture teams (two combined Mosman/Norths teams in the U13s and two combined Mosman/Hunters Hill teams in the U16s).

Overall the number of registrations in 2014 declined by 50 players (6.7% decrease) with the biggest declines seen in the U11, U12, U13 and U15 age groups. This was offset by good growth in the U8, U14, and U16 age group, as well as the Girls competition.

The decline in player numbers mirrored the trends seen in a few of the other large Sydney clubs such as Newport (down 88 players) and Hunters Hill (down 98 players), with Harbord being the most noticeable club to increase in size (up 61 players) to 5th in the overall rankings.

Across the entire SJRU competition there were 70 clubs who fielded teams, with 13,620 registered players, an increase of 49 players (3.6% increase) compared to 13,571 players in 2013. Mosman registrations again ranked at number 1, and this is a commendable position for the club and the community, and the combined commitment to Junior Rugby Union.

The breakdown of New Registrations for 2014 and Renewals to the Mosman Junior Rugby Club, are shown below in **Table [3]**.

There is some consideration for a degree of error in these numbers due to replication of original players in the submission of online registrations in the Buddha system. Therefore, renewals would be reflected more accurately as a higher percentage of total registrations.

The SJRU and the Australian Rugby Union (ARU) are attempting to implement a more accurate and technologically capable system to replace Buddha in 2015. This system is the Rugby Link system and is due for completion for January 2015. Across the Sydney Clubs, the system has been reviewed by the Registrars who have also been consulted as to its effectiveness. As a representative for the MJRC, I have supported the use of the new system in principle as the Buddha administration system has encountered some deficiencies and is reasonably laborious in its use.

Further to the Registrar role, the awards and trophies at the completion of the season were organised as well as the respective Minis Gala Day and U10-U16 awards ceremonies at The Whalehouse. It is recommended to continue this tradition and to expand the scope of this event to make it a celebration and significant event on the MJRC calendar, culminating in accolades for the players and teams as well as all the support staff. This should be held at the The Whalehouse and be attended by all teams, as an entire and united Mosman Junior Rugby Club. It is also recommended that the awards and trophies and organisation of this event be taken from the Registrar role and given to the newly suggested 'Events Coordinator', minimising the Registrar workload and enabling improved execution of the Event.

For the 2014 Presentation Day, a Participation Trophy awarded to all U6-U9 players (222), and a MJRC Medal for participation to all U10-U16 players (419). Each age group (excluding U6 and U7s) also had a Most Valuable Player (MVP) and a Most Improved Player (MIP) awarded. These players are highlighted in Table [4]. Thank you to Sydney Awards and Trophies for their ongoing commitment to the club and the supply of all awards in a timely manner. This is the 5th year of association with the Club and it is recommended they continue to supply all awards.

Every year, players reaching 100 games are also awarded a special plaque. Congratulations also to those boys achieving this milestone, the MJRC is very proud of your commitment to the sport of Rugby Union and look forward to your continued involvement.

For the 2015 season and ongoing, it is recommended, that due to expansion of the MJRC from its original player numbers, that the Registrar Role be divided into two roles, and some of the responsibilities from the role in its current form, be delegated.

The proposed recommendation is that there is a Mini's Registrar (U6-U9), who will - in conjunction with the nominated Mini's co-ordinator and the respective AGCs - allocate teams and manage all Coaches and Manager correspondence via the new Rugby Link system where required. For 2014, the Minis made up 32% of all registrations, and also historically comprise a high percentage of manual registrations and new registrations, therefore require a higher initial workload.

It is also suggested that there be a Junior Registrar - responsible for the U10-U16 age groups - and also the Girls competition. This would involve the management of all teams and allocation following the grading process as well as correct team sheets and photo sheet for every player and team. It would also entail identifying front rowers, and transferrable and non-transferrable players in the system, and regularly adjusting player lists due to injury or other requirements. Close communication via each AGC is required, and all Coaches and Managers should refer queries through the relevant AGC to the Registrar. This role would also involve some dispensation consultation and escalation. Relationships with the SJRU and Competitions Manager throughout the season are also necessary from a Registrar perspective and clear understanding of the SJRU rulings for these age groups.

All events and the organisation of end of season awards should be given to the newly formed Events Co-ordinator role, although the Registrar would remain required to consult in relation to these awards and provide necessary information to the Events personnel.

This plan to separate duties and roles should ensure the Registrar role is managed well and the workload is dissipated and more manageable for future volunteers, encouraging further involvement of parents and supporters for the MJRC.

Congratulations to MJRC for its strong support of Rugby Union, as this community remains the largest Rugby Club in NSW. We look forward to our 700 plus registrations in 2015 and beyond with more great Rugby across all age groups in Mosman.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2014

The financial year 2014 delivered a net deficit of \$56,185 the Club (surplus \$75,134 – 2013) and at 30 September 2014 the club is in a strong financial position.

The deficit in FY 14 is driven by two material items: the clubhouse renovation and enhanced ground maintenance.

The clubhouse renovations have been classified as Leasehold improvements and will be amortised over the life of the seniors lease commitment with Mosman Council.

The additional expenditure in FY 14 is consistent with the club's commitment to invest in the current facilities and support the local community.

The club still maintains accumulated surpluses as at 30 September 2014 of \$490,193, which includes, a BT Investment Fund of \$128,761 and primary bank accounts with Westpac.

Sponsorship is a key revenue stream for the club and we would like to thank all of our sponsors for their ongoing support: Allianz, LJ Hooker, Commonwealth Private, 3Corp and Olympus Sports.

Two tours were conducted this year: the annual U12s tour to Queenstown and an U15s tour to Samoa and information is disclosed as additional notes in the financial report.

Financial Statements will be presented to the Club's Annual General Meeting and will be lodged with the Department of Fair Trading. They are also available to Members upon request to the Club Secretary.

NORTHERN SUBURBS REPRESENTATIVE JUNIOR RUGBY REPORT 2014

Overall 2014 proved to be another successful year for all age groups with strong representation from Mosman Junior Rugby Club.

U10s Warringah Rugby Park Narrabeen: This year reverted to fielding 2 teams with Mosman providing 10 players overall.

U11s Kierle Park Manly: Made it through to the Semi Final against the strong Manly team. Manly won the game and went on to win the tournament. Norths went on to win the 3rd/4th play-off against Randwick in convincing style to finish 3rd overall. A fantastic effort by the boys playing 7 games with a 5 wins to 2 loss record. 12 players were represented from Mosman.

U12s Camden Rugby Club Camden: Enjoyed the Camden experience and the team played strongly in all games however a tough weekend losing 4 of 5 games. 4 players were represented from Mosman.

U13s Wanderers Rugby Club Newcastle: On paper a strong team allocated to a tough pool with a loss to previous champions Manly and a narrow loss to Central West who went on to secure 5th spot. From that point on the team lifted, wining their last pool game against Randwick and dominating wins in the remaining 2 playoff games with a big win over Hunter and Easts finishing 10th overall. 14 players were represented from Mosman.

U14s Emus Rugby Club Orange: Started as second seed but knowing the top 4 sides were all evenly matched. Strong wins through the pool matches and the quarter-final against Southern Districts saw them in the semi-final against the eventual winner, the ACT Brumbies. In the end the score line was a 29-5 loss. Norths shrugged off the disappointment of the semi-final loss and came out to strongly defeat Illawarra 31-17. Finishing 3rd overall with 8 players represented from Mosman.

U15s Drummoyne Oval: The squad went into camp at Chowder Bay. They started a little slowly as defending champions but had solid convincing wins through the pool matches and a "champagne" rugby performance to beat Illawarra 87 - 0 in the quarter-final. A win in the semis against 4th seeds Hunter, 38-5. Opponents in the final were Randwick, and after just beating them in last year's final they were hungry for revenge. This clearly was not going to happen as from the start the North's boys came out firing and never let Randwick into the game, going on to win the final 24-0. Incredibly, this was the first time Randwick had been kept scoreless since U10s. 5 players were represented from Mosman.

U16s St Lukes Oval Concord: 13 players were represented from Mosman who competed strongly in the championships.

CLUBHOUSE, GROUNDS AND REFEREES REPORT 2014

Clubhouse

This year, with massive assistance from our partnership with Allianz Stadium, we have realised years of hard work by many people to refurbish and anoint The Whalehouse at Rawson Oval as the Clubhouse for all of Mosman Rugby Union.

In 2008, celebrating the 50 year anniversary of the Junior Club, funds were raised to contribute to a clubhouse. The anniversary prompted discussions for Mosman Junior and Senior clubs to join forces to invest in the clubhouse at Rawson Park, promoting community rugby in Mosman as a gender-inclusive sport for all ages and providing a clear pathway from junior to senior rugby. The increased community spirit allowed the club to raise funds to further invest in the grounds and facilities to improve the sporting experience at Rawson Oval.

In 2013, a joint Senior and Junior Club renovation project commenced and was completed in July 2014. The refurbished Mosman 'Whalehouse' was officially opened by the Mayor, Councillor Peter Abelson, and by the combined Senior and Junior Mosman Rugby Clubs on August 28, 2014. Our Member of Parliament, the Hon. Gillian Skinner was also present.

Over \$200,000 was invested in the upgrade, and this came from multiple sources including the original fundraising in 2008, grants from NSW Community Grants Council and from our new partnership with Mosman Senior Rugby and Allianz Stadium. The Club has also invested over \$100,000 on the playing surface at Rawson Oval.

Now we have a fantastic clubhouse to further develop the great community that is Mosman Rugby Union, and increased access to Rawson Oval so more Juniors can play at Rawson Oval, the Minis can play there, we can increase girls touch and continue this all through the summer months with the kick off of Non-Contact Sevens this summer.

Many thanks to Daniel Dickson, a Mosman dad who facilitated the renovation. Final recognition must go to Michael Flude, Dave Collard and Tom Jeavons-Fellows for the passion, commitment and time that they have and continue to put in to making the Whalehouse what it is today.

Grounds

Due to material changes made in 2013 to Mosman Council's policies relating to ground use, 2014 was the first season of these new policies. The changes in 2013 granted Mosman Rugby (Seniors and Juniors) priority use over Rawson and Balmoral West. This clarity and certainty has meant we have been able to invest in works at these grounds, especially at Rawson Oval. These works included a reduction in the area of the turf cricket pitch and the



phasing out of the turf practice wickets at the southern end of the ground, with the latter due to disappear entirely around Christmas 2014. In addition, the club contributed to extra resurfacing and drainage. The work on improving the playing surface at Rawson Oval, when combined with the renovation of The Whalehouse, means Rawson Oval will be a worthy home to rugby in Mosman.

However, there was an impact. Due to both the renovation of The Whalehouse, and works at Rawson, our pre-season was significantly interrupted, both on and off the field, and Rawson was not available for matches until late April. Although this made everything more difficult than normal, it was a necessary part of developing the venue to be more suited to rugby and we will continue to work towards making Rawson a fit for purpose rugby venue, irrespective of weather or season. The benefits of this policy will be seen as changes are made each season. Further changes are also expected as a result of the Council awarding the grounds maintenance contract to a new service provider, effective 1st October 2014.

We were also able to be a venue host for Grand Final Day, which saw eight Grand Finals held at Rawson on 7th September. Although the ground was wet and the early weather was ordinary, it turned out to be a wonderful day and highlighted how spectacular Rawson can be, whether on the field, surveying the views, partaking of the local cuisine or sampling the offerings in The Whalehouse. We are looking forward to many such days.

Referees

Although at times some might think a game of rugby without a referee is a good thing, the reality is that without match officials, we would not have matches. As the largest junior club in our region, we therefore call upon a lot of resources to enable our matches. Therefore, it is incumbent upon us to help provide and develop people who can become match officials.

Historically, all matches from U10 and older (Juniors) have had accredited referees from one of the regional referee associations appointed through the NSW Rugby Union (NSWRU) centralised appointments system, with any appointments unable to be filled then referred to the home club for appointment. This has not always worked as effectively as it could, which in the past has resulted in a number of "no-shows" or inappropriate appointments. However, 2014 saw a much improved process, resulting in a high percentage of matches being covered centrally, with very little "Club to Appoint" matches required, so a big thankyou to both NSWRU and in particular Scott Rogan, and the Sydney North Rugby Referees association.



Matches for U9 and younger (Minis) had been handled differently, with each team nominating a member or members of the parent body to be a referee when playing at home. Generally this has worked well, but with a desire to both develop new referees, and provide consistency on match day, we started our first ever program of referee appointments for Minis. Being our initial year, our focus was to provide all U9 home matches with referees, and should resources enable it, U8s as well. This presented an opportunity to our older playing group to take the first step in becoming referees, and so we ran a "Refereeing Kids Rugby" course in the pre-season. Paid for by the club, this course enables the successful participant to referee matches in the U8 – U12 age group. There are many benefits that flow from this:

- Increasing the rugby knowledge of our older Juniors, which in turn develops their own rugby
- Develops a stronger bond between those players and the club
- Provides a pathway of development for match officials
- Provides a trained, arm's length match official for our Minis
- Provides consistency of on field law application, particularly important for the U9s as they develop during the season and prepare for Juniors and
- Some pocket money for our junior referees.

2015 will see this develop further, as appointments to Minis matches become more centralised across our Minis competition (essentially the lower North Shore of Sydney), which means both U8s and U9s will be covered by at the least an Refereeing Kids Rugby (RKR) trained referee. It also means matches outside Mosman will be available for our own RKR referees.

Due to both ground and clubhouse works in 2014, running training courses was problematic, but this will be less of an issue in 2015, which means we will be running a number of courses at The Whalehouse. These will include:

- Refereeing Kids Rugby (RKR)
- Assistant Referee (AR). Previously known as Touch Judges, ALL Junior teams MUST have an accredited AR at EVERY match, so this is an opportunity to not only contribute to your child's team, but to learn more about rugby AND get a front row seat.
- Level 1 (Foundation) Referee. This course provides the opportunity to referee all ages, including adults, and provides excellent insight into how the game is played, coached and refereed.



These courses are available to all at the club – parents, siblings, players and other family members. They are non-gender specific, and we strongly support, and encourage, female participation in match officiating. The recent Women's Rugby World Cup Final was refereed by Amy Perrett, a Sydney referee, so the opportunity is unlimited, especially with the Rio Olympics quickly approaching.

More information about these courses will be available in our pre-season communications, so please keep an eye on your emails early in the New Year. Remember – refereeing – the best seat in the house!

COACHING REPORT 2014

This year we held coaching courses for Smartrugby Accreditation and Level One at Rawson Oval. Both courses were well attended by Mosman coaches and managers and supported by the ARU. On reflection we held the first Smartrugby course too early in the season which meant we weren't able to capture as many coaches and managers as we could have. This will obviously be taken into account when scheduling for next season.

For the first time this year we decided to engage an external resource to help 'Train the Trainer', particularly in relation to the U6s and U7s, and the U8s as they move from touch to tackle. The aim of the training sessions being to give the Mums and Dads the tools to manage young groups of kids and an idea of how to run a session.

Jason Grier from ReadyRugby was selected after we approached a number of companies to develop a program to assist those Mums and Dads. We ran preseason sessions with all our U6, U7 and U8 coaches managers assisting with:

- Managing/engaging children
- Preparing coaching plans
- Coaching tips and techniques
- Tackling practise for the U8s

Jason also provided a coaching manual that was co-branded with Mosman Junior Rugby and presented to all the Minis coaches. The manual included training session plans for 20 sessions that the coaches could use. Overall feedback was great and a worthwhile exercise that should continue next year. We will also attempt to engage more specialist coaches for one session with groups of boys who play specific positions.

Recommendations for 2015 are:

- That we continue with the external resource to assist Coaches and Managers
- That all Coaches should undertake the new Working with Children (WWC) accreditation WWC via RMS
- That we will look to expand the use of specialist coaching programs.

MINIS EVENTS 2014

The Mosman Minis kicked off this year with strong registrations in February. Once registrations were completed the AGCs, Coaches and Managers got to work with the Coaches and Managers Night (with the assistance of Damian Martyr and Ready Rugby) in early March. Teams were announced earlier this year in mid-March with the Kit Handout/Meet the Team a week before the Lindfield/Wahroonga Gala Day (Rounds 1 and 2) in the first week of April. This allowed each of the teams a week of training prior to the Lindfield/Wahroonga Gala Day.

The Lindfield/Wahroonga Gala Day was a great way to start the season. Despite the threatening weather all of the MJRC Teams put in a great effort after the summer break.

Throughout the year the Minis participated in a number of activities other than the usual Gordon Juniors Minis Competitions:

- Sydney JRC March Past
- Hunters Hill Gala Day U9s
- Harbord Harlequins Gala Day U8s and U9s
- North Sydney Gala Day Preview to Norths Senior Game U8s



Dufficy Cup – U9s. A special note should go to all of the U9 Dufficy Cup participants this year. The Dufficy Cup is hosted by Hunters Hill JRC at the end of the U9 season and is held on a Friday evening pursuant to U10 conditions. This gives those participants an insight into what to expect in the U10s and is a great way to build upon all of the skills the boys have learnt though the Minis. The Mosman boys put in an awesome performance to comprehensively win their pool games to make their way into the final against West Harbour. Unfortunately West Harbour prevailed in the final but the spirit, effort and performance left no doubt that the Mosman Minis have produced a good standard for the boys to build upon in their coming and formative years ahead.

The conclusion of the Minis rugby season was marked by the Minis Trophy presentation Day, held at Rawson Oval. Unfortunately the wet weather set in which meant that we were restricted to the newly renovated Whalehouse. The show still went on and each of the teams was presented with their trophies and awards.

Finally, thanks to Bonnie Wiles and the U8s for hosting the annual Jeans and Jersey Night in the newly renovated Whalehouse earlier in the year. They did a fantastic job for arranging the event. Great food by Chargrill Charlies, ambient music and delicious desserts made it a great night out.

Congratulations to all the Minis and their parents for a fantastic season.

MATTERS TRIALLED AND RAISED DURING THE 2014 SEASON

1. U6 - TRAINING

In 2014 training on a Thursday was trialled at 5.00pm for 30 minutes. This was implemented for 2 primary reasons:

- 30 minutes was thought all was needed to capture the attention of the U6s (being the end of the day and the first year of school)
- Given the large number of Minis team training on a Thursday evening, greater space is available for the U7 U9s from 5.30pm 6.30pm.

Recommendation for 2015 Season

The recommendation is for training for the U6s to continue at 5.00pm on a Thursday for 30 minutes.

2. COACHING

In 2014 it was trialled that coaching support for Coaches of the Minis would be provided by an external source (in 2015 Ready Rugby) during the "Coaches & Managers Night" period along with the first 4 weeks of the season. This support was in the form of the external source running aspects of the Coaches & Managers Nights along with attending training



with specific support provided to the U6 Coaches. A coaching manual was also provided as a guide only and starting point for the coaching team.

Recommendation for 2015 Season

The recommendation is for this support to continue but for it to also be extended in the following ways:

- The external source be available at training more regularly throughout the season (ie. consider having someone at training every week or every second week for the Coaches to call upon across all age groups)
- Emphasis that the coaching manual is to be used as a "guide only" and coaches should feel free to depart from it if they wish
- Continue to develop being part of the "coaching team" within the club. It has been found that coaches have learnt a lot throughout the season from discussing matters with coaches in other teams within that year level. Whether it is at the end of training on a Thursday night or in their own time, it is recommended that AGCs for each age group hold a meeting of coaches within each year level on a monthly basis. Although done in a structured way to start with, it is hoped this will naturally develop over time.

3. FIELD SET UP/CHANGEOVER

Given numerous complaints from previous years, in 2014 we trialled a structured ground set-up procedure with each team being responsible and the ground marshals for 1 Saturday (whether it be Balmoral Oval or Rawson Oval). We also trialled the use of goal posts for the Minis in the 2014 season along with the use of white cones for game day and coloured cones only for training. A significant amount of time has been invested in the set-up procedures (including explanations and charts).

Recommendation for 2015 Season

It is recommended that the field set-up and changeover be continued in 2015. In most parts (except for the siren and cones at Rawson Oval), the equipment generally stayed intact for most of the 2014 season. The use of the Minis goal posts was a success and it generally compensates when cones go missing. The use of white cones only for game days also appeared to ensure that there were generally enough game day cones come Saturday morning.

4. **REFEREES**

Every club except Lane Cove and Mosman in the 2014 season participated in the pooling of referees for Minis matches (U8/U9s). Mosman and Lane Cove provided their own referees from their own pool of resources.



Recommendation for 2015 Season

Although the Mosman pool of referees were excellent in 2014, it has now been voted at a recent Gordon Minis Meeting that all clubs that participate in the Gordon Minis Meeting are to contribute referees on into the one pool of referees. Referees in 2015 will be allocated to U8 and U9 games from this pool on a Thursday/Friday before the Saturday when the game is scheduled. In the event that a referee is not allocated then each AGC will have to notify each team to ensure that a parent can referee the match.

Teams should continue to provide parent referees for all home U6 and U7 matches throughout the 2015 season.

5. TEAM ANNOUNCEMENTS/BRIEFINGS

Breaking with tradition, team announcements occurred in 2014 before the kit handout nights (end of March) but at or around the same time as the Coaches and Managers Nights (mid March). It was scheduled to occur before the Coaches and Managers Nights.

Recommendation for 2015 Season

Team announcement should occur as soon as possible after registration ends at the end of February 2015. In an ideal situation the order of events should occur in the following order (subject to ground availability, timing of Easter/school holidays and kit being available):

- Registration ends (end of February);
- Team announcements (first week in March);
- Coaches and Managers Night (2nd week in March);
- Coaches and Managers (3rd week in March);
- Kit Handout/Meet the team (3rd week in March);
- 1st week of training for Minis (4th week in March/week of the Gala Day)

This should be able to be achieved in 2015 given the proposed split of the Registrar's position into 2 roles. 1 role for the U10-U16 and another for the U6 - U9.

6. WET WEATHER/GROUND CLOSURES

While it was infrequent this season, a couple of wet weather days unnecessarily caused confusion where grounds were declared open on the Wet Weather Line and the Mosman JRC Grounds person declared them closed.

The protocol is straight-forward:

Home Games/Training

- If the Wet Weather Line says grounds are closed the grounds are closed.
- If the Wet Weather Line says grounds are opens all games remain on unless or until AGCs inform Managers/Coaches otherwise. AGCs will receive their information from the Minis Co-ordinator.



Away Games

- All games remain on unless parents are notified otherwise by their team managers. Team Managers will either receive their information directly from opposing team managers or from their own AGC's/Minis Co-ordinator.
- When there is an away game, it is always good and proper protocol to seek out the opposing Team Manager on the Friday evening if the weather is looking uncertain.

Recommendation for 2015 Season

Team Managers be reminded of the above on a regular basis by AGCs. Although well intentioned, Managers and Coaches that depart from the above invariably create an additional layer(s) of communication that invariably creates confusion.

7. INTRODUCTION/WELCOME NOTE

Although an introduction/welcome note was prepared for 2014 for a number of reasons it was not distributed in early 2014. Such an introduction/welcome note contains, among other things, key personnel, key dates along with parent/player conduct and standards required and expected at Mosman JRC.

It is thought that the delivery of such a note at Registration and/or on the MJRC Website Home Page goes a long way to setting out expectations at the start of the Minis rugby season. This will also provide vital information to new families to Mosman JRC.

Recommendation for 2015 Season

Update the introduction/welcome note and provide at Registration and/or Home Page at the start of the 2015 season.

8. GALA DAY/DUFFICY CUP TEAM U9

Throughout the year both the U8 and U9s are exposed to teams outside of the Gordon and Norths Districts through various Gala Days. Most Minis do not realise that although Mosman plays in the Gordon Minis District competition it is actually a part of the Norths District. Accordingly, at the conclusion of the season, Hunters Hill (Norths District) usually run the Dufficy Cup that is designed to give the U9s in the Norths District a taste of what to expect on the bigger fields and gives an insight into how the Mosman teams are fairing going into a grading process in the U10s by playing other Norths teams as well as other invited teams from other districts from across Sydney.

Although U9 Mosman teams usually do quite well, it is evident that the Mosman teams have not had as much time together as some of the other teams that participate in Gala Days and/or the Dufficy Cup.

One suggestion has been for any U9s that are interested to put themselves forward for a Gala Day/Dufficy Trial team (with no restriction as to numbers) that start to train together much earlier in the season. To date Gala Day entrants have been on an adhoc basis.



However, this suggestion entails the trial "squad" training every 3 weeks and be over and above usual training on a Thursday. This would enable the AGC/Coaches to select the best possible team (for Gala Days and the Dufficy Cup) and would also allow for skill levels to evolve over the season (ensuring that just because a child was in a Gala Day at the start of the season does not necessarily mean that they are at the end).

Recommendation for 2015 Season

Although there is merit to the above idea, it would require the commitment of an AGC and a team of coaches from the U9 year level. It would also require a high degree of transparency with parents of U9 children. Although this initiative should be looked into further, I would recommend a structured program (including objectives) to ensure transparency and expectations are managed of all U9 children if this was thought of being implemented.

U10s REPORT 2014

Season 2014 was a year of learning for all involved in the under 10 age group. The internal grading process was augmented with a number of external trials hosted by Newport, Drummoyne and Hunters Hill. Given the size of the U10 playing group, it was always going to be a challenge to find enough trials, and we were grateful to these clubs for hosting and organising these trial days.

It is never an easy task to decide which players should fall where and this year, as always, we have to give thanks to a number of parents who gladly put their hand up to assist. By the end of the process it was great to see that once again Mosman was able to field 5 teams in the SJRU competition. It was also pleasing to note that each of the teams were able to rely on the coaching, assistant coaching and managerial skills of volunteer parents.

One the field the season was a mixed one with varying levels of performance and success both within and across the teams. Both the Sharks (third team) and the Stingrays (fifth team) managed to make it through to their respective finals competitions, with the Stingrays (who finished fourth) unfortunately being eliminated from the finals by drawing their minor semi-final match. Greater success for the Sharks though who went on to raise the premiership trophy as undefeated champions.

The season started with the team being relegated to the B grade competition and with the immediate challenge of showing the SJRU that we were worthy of being in the A grade. In the finals the Dolphins were knocked out in the qualifying final by the eventual premiers, Lindfield, in a game of two halves – the Bucks came out of the blocks strongly to get just too far ahead by half-time, before a spirited 2nd half performance by the Dolphins dominating possession, territory and the scoreboard but just not quite enough to reverse the first half deficit.

Throughout the season, despite being much smaller than every other team, the Dolphins

Coaches Report

At the start of the season we knew a few things:

- 1) we had a good stable of capable players
- we were unsure of player availability week to week given school commitments (sporting and otherwise) and injury status and
- 3) we were light in a few positions.

These considerations pointed to us adopting a simple approach where all players needed to be prepared to play in a number of positions, to know the calls and to adapt in combinations alongside their teammates. It required them to assess and react to tactics of the opposition, be relied on to get the basics right and to be instinctive in playing the game. In other words, the team members needed to become creative, dependable rugby players rather to than follow a script.

Players were urged from the start to take responsibility for their own performance (particularly defence), improve communication and team skills and to put themselves forward as leaders when required throughout the matches.

We struggled with this concept initially – we got smashed in scrums, line out was messy, attacking moves were over-complicated and ruck defence was less than impervious. We still managed to score some well-worked tries through impressive individual skills. Without regular training it was not until The State Championships that time allowed us to work on a number of these aspects that then laid the foundation for a good run of matches and results. Even though we gave away size to almost every team we played against, the scrum



was solid. Some of tries scored in the latter matches were gems, showcasing the ability to read the play and high level of ball skills.

The main area that stifled the team early in the season and that continued to lapse later in the season was defensive frailty. The final match against Raptors demonstrated that when we wanted to, we could absolutely fix that area of our game. Against a settled team with plenty of bulk (that had beaten us twice before during the season) we dominated the contact area to set us up for a deserved victory.

So, what do we now know at the end of the season?

- We have some great rugby players solid, dependable blokes who turn up and get on with it;
- 2) We have some great rugby players blokes who work hard, get the basics right, don't shirk the physical contact and improve their tactical awareness and skills; and
- 3) We have some great rugby players blokes who top the list in integrity and will be good mates for years to come.

Congratulations to each and every one of the players. Looking forward to buying you a beer or two when you are next playing club rugby (Colts).

NON-CONTACT 7s RUGBY REPORT

As part of its agreement with Mosman Council on priority use of Rawson Oval, Mosman Rugby committed to increase utilisation of the facility during summer. The timing of this commitment coincided with Australian Rugby Union starting to develop a new, rugby-based, non-contact game.

Summer Non-Contact 7s is a key ARU initiative co-developed and piloted by Mosman Rugby with the following characteristics:

- A non-contact rugby union-based game to expand participation and involvement in rugby union clubs and schools
 - o Gender inclusive and all ages
 - Simple rules, layout, equipment, organisation
 - o Build on special rugby club community values
- ARU initiative supported through ARU staff / development / referees and branding
- Provide a fund-raising opportunity for clubs to further invest in grounds / facilities / improve member experience (unlike NSW touch or Oztag)
- Provide a pathway and skills development for full-contact rugby 7s and 15s with rules to promote emphasis on Rugby Union skills-set
- A fun rugby experience (distinctively rugby union)
- Simple / easy / no hassle for parents / players (same time/place/day every week)
- 'Low touch' no need for coaches / managers / assistant referees etc, from the parent body.
- Referees (enjoyment managers) are selected to run the sessions.
- Less emphasis on competition for players

With Mosman Cricket still using the practice wicket at Rawson on Tuesday and Thursday nights until Christmas 2014, Mosman Rugby could book grounds Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights between 5pm and 9pm. The ground capacity per time slot is 2 full sized or 3 junior sized fields, allowing the timeslots shown in the following timetable.

INTERNATIONAL TOUR – BARRACUDAS (CUDAS) TOUR REPORT 2014



It is an established MJRC tradition that our U12 age group tours Queenstown New Zealand in early July. This year 31 boys were selected to represent the Club on this fantastic tour. After many months of hard work, training and

fundraising the boys, and about 70 parents and siblings, arrived in Queenstown for both rugby and adventure.

The boys played six games of rugby and were broken into two floating squads of equal ability with boys from each squad acting as subs for the other. The Tour is based in Queenstown but games were also played in Wanaka and Cromwell.

The Tour is not a graded tour with the selection criteria based primarily on years of service at the Club. The ethos of the Tour is "Better Boys make Better Men" and right from selection the boys know that they have to earn the right to play by raising personal funds, general fund raising, community service and by attending separate weekly Cudas training sessions.

Our Head Coach this year was Warren Garrett, and he was ably assisted by Stephen Lidbury and Tony Braham. Warren had the Boys focused very quickly with the training commencing during the pre-season on the sand at Balmoral Beach. The boys were well versed in the knowledge that playing rugby in New Zealand would not be easy!

DAY 1

Our Tour kicked off early morning on Saturday the 28th of June with a 5.30am arrival at Sydney Airport with the entire tour group excited and eager to get underway. Departure all went very smoothly apart from one of our parents leaving his passport back in Mosman and having to return home and get it with only minutes to spare.



The boys were buzzing but still behaved very well on the flight over and we arrived in Queenstown and settled the boys into their accommodation at Pinewood Lodge. The boys were allocated rooms in alphabetical order in groups of three and all made new friends as a result.



After settling in, the Coach was keen to run the boys, so the team went off to a nearby oval and let off some steam whilst the adults and siblings familiarised themselves with their new surrounds. The Wakitipu Rugby Club was hosting a senior's game that day so the coach was keen for the boys to watch some grass roots rugby and to witness the cold and wet conditions. The visiting team had former All Black Andrew Hore playing and the standard was very high for a club game. Another Former All Black Justin Marshall was also at the ground and was quickly noticed by the Aussie contingent.

The Wakatipu local club have been great hosts for the Cuda Tour since inception and the Cudas are always made to feel very welcome when we are in town. After the game the boys were handed to the two lucky dads on night one supervision duty for showers and preparation for the Maori Hangi meal at Pinewood.

DAY 2

On Sunday morning the boys were up early and off to breakfast, then Bungy Jumping for the brave at AJ Hackett Queenstown. About 24 Cudas, siblings and parents made the leap, and all apparently enjoyed it. It was a great spectacle for the rest of the tour to observe, particularly the varying emotions of each jumper. Once on tour the pace is frenetic and it wasn't long before we were due at lunch and the afternoon activities. The boys and some family had lunch at Speights Ale House before an afternoon of paintball. Another group of Whale Watchers (the nickname for Cudas parents) went off to a great lunch at Amisfield Winery. Both the paintball and the Amisfield lunch went off safely with a good time had by all. Both the boys and the Whale Watchers had settled in well to the rigours of the Tour. That night two Dads had a battle on their hands but managed to get the boys asleep in preparation for the first game day next morning.







DAY 3

Monday morning started with 7.30am breakfast ready for our 9.00am departure to Wanaka. The Group boarded our 2 Coaches and we headed off for our first two matches against Upper Clutha and a combined Upper Clutha / Roxburgh Team. It was a typically cold, wet and windy day in the South Island with the temperature hovering between zero and three degrees Celsius. We arrived at 10.30am at the Upper Clutha home ground to a very waterlogged and muddy pitch and I immediately realised that I had forgotten the towels for



showering after the games. Thankfully our hosts were able to accommodate the boys with towels supplied by a local laundromat.

The boys had dinner at Pinewood and the Whale Watchers sampled one of the finer dining establishments of Queenstown. The only people not happy were the Dad's assigned to team laundry as it took hours to get the gear clean and dry for our second lot of games next day.



DAY 4

Again an early start and off on the coaches to Cromwell for our games against the Central Otago under 38kg Rep Team and the local Cromwell club team. The weather had improved to 6 degrees!

In the first game, we played a strong combination against Cromwell and had a big win.

GAME 3: Cudas 80 defeated Cromwell 0

We later discovered that a lot of the Cromwell boys were only 11 but to their credit never gave up and tried their best right to the final siren.

In the second game, we came up against a very classy albeit small Rep Team.

GAME 4: Otago Reps (U38kg) 38 defeated Cudas 17

The locals had too much experience and skill and clearly showed that size was not a problem. We had a quick presentation and a light meal hosted by Cromwell and then back on coaches to Pinewood Lodge. The Boys had now played 4 games of rugby and were half way through their Tour. Surprisingly there was still plenty of energy as the night duty dads would continue to attest to.



DAY 5

Wednesday was a rest day with some afternoon activities. The tour contingent enjoyed lunch at the "Pig & Whistle " followed by the Shot Over Jet Boat ride. Unfortunately the weather closed in and our Helicopter Ride was put off until the following morning. The boys enjoyed the Luge up behind the Gondola and the contingent all dined at the Skyline that night before coming back down the Gondola to Pinewood Lodge. Even without the helicopter the boys had a great day and were now fairly exhausted.

DAY 6

Everyone awoke to a very cold day in Queenstown with the Barra Cup and Cuda Cups to be played in town at 1pm and 2pm respectively. After breakfast all those that were booked for the Helicopter on Wednesday's aborted trip headed off to take a scenic flight around the Remarkables which included a plateau landing. This was one of the highlights of the Tour



and all that went were very pleased they did.

Coach Garrett assembled the players early for the Barra Cup. The Ground was very wet and the temperature was hovering around zero. Unfortunately news had filtered through about our good win on Tuesday and Alexandria fielded a very strong and large team. The boys gave it their all after being well down at half time and conceded only 2 tries in the second half.

The character showed by the Boys did their Club proud. As the temperature was now moving towards the negative, Coach Garrett had some convincing to do to get the Boys to wait as subs for the Cuda Cup. Again we met a very formidable opposition and were well beaten but fought the whole way. Wakitipu retained the Cuda Cup for another year.

GAME 6: Wakatipu defeated Cudas

Our Hosts put on a great meal in the Wakatipu Club House and we all enjoyed their hospitality for many hours after the games. Although beaten, the boys made us all very proud of their effort and courage in very difficult

With all the rugby now out of the way, Friday saw a lot of the contingent head off to the slopes for skiing, snowboarding or just relaxing on the mountain. The remainder spent the day sightseeing or resting up after a very busy week. Chico's Restaurant was the location for the last night dinner and Tour Awards. The boys sitting and Player Awards Presentation was from 6.00 until 8.30pm with The Whale Watchers Dinner and Tour Awards commencing immediately after. Our Tour Judge handled the presentation extremely well and all Whale Watchers that broke any Tour Rules were duly dealt with.



DAY 8

Saturday morning arrived quickly and pack up had begun. The pace of the week was now evident on all faces but all the boys and parents pulled together to clean up and make the coach to the airport on time. A truly memorable Tour was now over and memories will be etched in all tourists' minds for years to come.



I would like to take this opportunity to the thank my Co Tour Leader, Peter Wiggs, who unfortunately had to pull out of the Tour only days before as his son became ill. Peter did a mountain of work in the lead up and contributed massively to its success. Also, James Garrett, who was the money-man, your help and contribution was invaluable.
