Our focus at Mosman Junior Rugby Club (MJRC) is the grassroots for players, coaches and officials and providing the most enjoyable, competitive environment for developing all the skills required to play this great game.

This year we had a team of over 20 on the MJRC Committee, who have devoted much time to this Club, and to ensuring all the members of our community are given a rugby experience like no other. We have some talented and committed people, who are listed in the following pages. Please take time to get to know who they are and know that their contributions are valued, delivering rugby to our community and leading the way for community Rugby Union right across NSW.

MJRC are the largest junior rugby club in NSW, and we are often guiding other clubs by implementing initiatives for the sport and its growth. This year, we have formed a new tradition at our club - the John Eales Shield and the Brothers Tour. Brothers Rugby Union is one of the largest junior rugby clubs in Queensland, and where John Eales began his career. Our U12 age group hosted and billeted a squad from Queensland in the inaugural tour, in



what is planned to be an annual event in a State vs State competition and experience over a weekend in May. MJRC hold the shield for 2015 and it is prominently placed in our clubhouse. A wonderful rugby tradition now for our club.



Our other initiative was agreeing to launch the summer Viva7s competition - a non-contact 7s Rugby program sanctioned by the ARU and designed to introduce non-contact rugby



across all age groups in a fast and fun environment, expanding the offering so more players can compete in a form of rugby. We hope to develop this program in the best interest of our club and to providing rugby to an extended sporting community.

We have been able to utilise the newly renovated Rawson Clubhouse for many events and rugby matches. We share this facility 50/50 with our Mosman Senior Rugby Club, and it has been wonderful to have such an impressive Clubhouse for our Junior Club, to host events, functions, meetings and entertain our opposition teams with a fully licensed bar and downstairs kiosk. Our Minis have some scheduled matches at Rawson Oval now too on a Saturday morning, a great introduction to what will become their home ground and Clubhouse. MJRC has invested significantly in this Clubhouse and the grounds to ensure our rugby club thrives now and well into the future with improved facilities for all our players and members to enjoy.

Aside from the impressive results on the field throughout the season (see **Table 1** for MJRC Grand Finalists), this Club has played rugby in the true spirit of the game throughout the year. Our governing body, the Sydney Junior Rugby Union (SJRU) has advised that MJRC received no red cards, no judicial hearings and has an exemplary behaviour record for 2015. As the largest club in this competition, this is significant and all players should be proud.

We have enjoyed many additional benefits and experiences as part of belonging to this rugby community. Aside from our regular competition, we have rugby tours. Details of these are given in the ensuing reports. Both traditional tours - the U12 Barracuda (CUDAS) tour to Queenstown New Zealand, and the U15 Samoan tour was particularly special for 2015.

The Samoan tour provides an entirely different perspective and experience, all still revolving around rugby for our Mosman boys at a crucial development stage in their lives. This tour is firmly planted in our MJRC calendar, with invaluable life experiences, as well as keeping young men playing sport and rugby well into their young adulthood. This year, we had some sad news about one of the players, learning he had aggressive leukaemia. The way this age group rallied around the family and the player is indicative of the spirit of this rugby community, and a credit to all who have helped.

Aside from tours, the events we have on an annual basis have this year been a wonderful success. Our Events Co-ordinator will provide details on the fabulous results, but as an overview, the following events occur annually on the MJRC calendar:

- Jeans and Jersey night organised by the U8 age group as a welcome to the season and to the Club, held at Rawson Clubhouse.
- **Samoa Lunch** fundraising casual lunch, organised by the touring U15 age group, held at Mosman RSL.
- **CUDAS Lunch** fundraising lunch, organised by the touring U12 age group, this year held at the impressive Noble Dining Room at Allianz Stadium, part of the Sydney Cricket and Sports Ground Trust, our platinum sponsor.



• Annual Ball - black tie, formal evening function, organised by the U11 age group, as an end of season affair. For 2015 this was also held at the Noble Dining Room at Allianz Stadium and was a wonderful success.

Every year, MJRC awards a 'Clubman of the Year' award for services to the Club throughout the season. This year it was awarded to Rob McKay, who looks after grounds and referees for his contributions to this and to his ongoing valued involvement. Well-deserved Rob, congratulations.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT 2015

2015 Mosman Junior Rugby Club Registration day was held in February at LJ Hooker House, the office of our Platinum Sponsor, LJ Hooker Mosman. Thank you to Geoff Smith and the LJ Hooker Mosman team for facilitating the annual launch of the rugby season.

Joining the registrars on Registration Day were Katrina Oxenham, Club President and the new Minis Coordinator, Anthony Hunt. The U7s coordinator, Nikki Warburton also provided great assistance. Russell Ekas from Olympus Sports and Dale Clarke, the Club's Gear Steward, also assisted in handing out rugby gear to the players.



The day was well attended by players joining the club, while most returning players registered online. Although it had been planned that a new registration system, RugbyLink, would be rolled out across the clubs, it was decided just before registrations opened that the Buddha system would be retained for another year.

For the first time the role of registrar was split into two. The Minis Registrar has responsibility for the U6 to U9s (which make up 37 % of the competition) while the Junior Registrar has responsibility for the U10s to U16s. The Juniors Registrar also looks after the Girls Competition; however, it is proposed to have a separate registrar for the Girls Competition in 2016.



The final numbers for 2015 are shown in **Table 1**.

652 players registered in 2015 across 39 teams.

The Minis fielded 21 teams and the Juniors had 18. There were 86 girls registered in Girls Competition. This means the Mosman Junior Rugby Club continues to be the largest junior rugby club in NSW. Despite this, there was decline of 46 players from the previous year. The declines appeared in U6, U8,U10, U11, U13, U14 and U16 groups. This reduction in numbers was offset by strong growth in the U7, U9, U12 and U15. There was a large increase in the Girls Competition. The decline appears to have occurred across all Clubs in the SJRU competition.

The 2015 Sydney Junior Rugby Union competition included 13,447 players from 70 clubs. A comparison of the top five rugby clubs is shown in **Table 2**.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2015

The financial year 2015 delivered a net surplus of \$65,537 to the Club (deficit \$56,185 – 2014) and at 30 September 2015, the Club is in a strong financial position.

The Club maintains accumulated surpluses as at 30 September 2015 of \$396,614, which includes a BT Investment Fund of \$131,590 and primary bank accounts with CBA.

Our ongoing Club sponsors are Allianz Stadium, LJ Hooker, Commonwealth Private, 3Corp and Olympus Sports. Their support of the Club is highly valued and much appreciated, thank you. We would also like to thank our new sponsor, Orthocare Orthodontics.

Our Annual Ball was a brilliant evening and a financial success. This event is the key fundraiser for the Club. Thank you to the social committee and U11 parents who volunteered their time to make the event a success.

Two tours were conducted this year: the annual U12's tour to Queenstown and the annual U15's tour to Samoa. Both of these tours relied exclusively on funding from tour specific fundraising events and player contributions. Much of the players' contributions was raised by players earning pocket money performing local community jobs and their own fund raising – well done boys. Financial information on the tours is disclosed as additional notes in the financial report.

During the year, the Club purchased new goal posts as part of our ongoing commitment to the facilities at Rawson, otherwise there was no other major purchases.

Financial Statements will be presented to the Club's Annual General Meeting and will be lodged with the Department of Fair Trading. They are also available to Members upon request to the Club Secretary

GROUNDS, REFEREES AND CLUBHOUSE REPORT 2015



A vital part of rugby is the match official, and as a major club, we have a responsibility to ensure a steady pipeline of officials are trained and developed to enable our players' matches to be officiated to the highest possible standard. In 2015, we held courses for:

- Refereeing Kids Rugby (RKR)
- Level 1 Assistant Referee (L1AR)
- Foundation (Coach or Referee).

Our total numbers at these courses were the highest in the greater Sydney area, so a big congratulations to all who participated. A particular shout-out to those who attended the L1AR course, which happened to coincide with a mini-cyclone

passing through the area. Special kudos to the bloke who turned up on his bicycle!

We are already underway with our planning for next season, with a view to again host the above core courses, and possibly some others. It is our intent to host these earlier in the season, so that by the time teams are finalised, all education will be complete and we will be able to put these extra skills to good use immediately.

Our challenge is to continue this ongoing education by:

- Up-skilling those who have already undertaken courses
- Introduce new people to the education system to enable them to not only assist, but understand the nuances of the game
- Increase the level of female participation. We have an increasing number of girls playing in our club, so at the very least we need to reflect that in female officials that support them.

The referee appointment system for Junior matches was managed centrally through NSWRU was, by and large, successful with minimal no-shows or scheduling issues. A large majority of the delinquencies that did occur were due to wet weather rescheduling, often at the last minute, which meant time and venue changes, which in turn meant the appointed referee was not available. This further highlights the need for our own people to be trained, as in the absence of a centrally appointed referee, each team is obliged under Competition Rules to be able to provide someone who can step in.



Refereeing Minis changed significantly this year, with these appointments also being centralised, albeit through a different system to the Juniors. The theory was that this would deepen the refereeing pool, provide appointment transparency and greater flexibility. The aim was to ensure all U8 and U9 matches had referees trained to at least RKR level. However, the reality was different, and given the large Minis contingent within the club, not all matches were filled. Only three external referees were made to Mosman matches, despite Mosman referees undertaking many more away matches. The learning from this is that we still need to develop enough of our own RKR referees to cover our matches, irrespective of the appointment mechanism. This presents a great opportunity for our older Junior players to be trained as referees and further develop their understanding of the game, work on their fitness, engage with others in the club as well as pick up some spending money.

The Grounds landscape changed in 2013, but two years on, we still have not seen the full extent of these changes. With Rawson and Balmoral West given to rugby as priority users during winter, it was frustrating that we were still compromised by the transition from the previous system. For example, the cricket training area at Rawson remained in place until the end of the 2015 rugby season. The transition was further exacerbated by Mosman Council changing grounds contractors at the end of the 2014 season. In the fullness of time, this will generate benefit as the grounds improve in quality, but it has been slow to date. Further complicating matters, the weather played its part. The aforementioned cyclone was one example in our rain-affected season. Days (or part thereof) lost to weather were:

- Training Days 16
- Playing Days 14

However, there have been positive developments. Rawson has had 4,000m² of turf re-laid, a hardier, faster growing turf which should provide a better base for rugby. The smaller cricket square has been re-levelled and re-laid, so that in heavy rain, the water drains AWAY from the square, not into it. This will greatly assist ground recovery when wet. Finally, towards the end of the season, we installed new goalposts, in keeping with Rawson being the home of rugby union in Mosman.

The Whalehouse, the off-field home of rugby union in Mosman, saw its first full season post the recent renovations and all those who have spent time inside can see the benefits of that. It is a fine venue, with excellent facilities and a sensational view, not just of the rugby, but the local area. The challenge now is to better utilise the space, both within the rugby union community, and the wider Mosman community.

REFEREES & GROUNDS COORDINATOR 2015



COACHING REPORT 2015

Coaches and Managers commenced the 2015 season with a well-attended information night at the Whalehouse, perhaps assisted by the lure of food and drinks. The night provided the opportunity to set the scene for the season ahead and reaffirm the MJRC commitment for inclusion, equal game time and development for all players. We also covered new Working with Children requirements, player welfare through new concussion management practices and an insightful overview of game management from the referee's perspective. A strong recommendation was encouraged for all coaches to complete the Foundation level 1 course to ensure the best credentials for all junior coaches.

The Club once again engaged the services of an external coaching provider in ReadyRugby to assist in running specific "Train the Trainer" sessions for our Minis coaches, with particular emphasis on U6s and U7s to help with management of young children and running structured and engaged training sessions. The U8s and U9s focused on more contact as they move from touch to tackle and a more physical game. These sessions were also well attended with positive feedback received.

A more specialised 'Train the Trainer' session specifically focused on the breakdown, scrums & lineouts and ball skills was also planned for the Junior (U10 – U16) coaches after competition round four, designed to provide coaches with more technical skills at these important set pieces. Unfortunately attendance was poor despite communication through AGCs and the Club website.

Recommendations for 2016 are:

- Seek to encourage new coaches to volunteer well ahead of season commencement
- Creation of a MJRC "style of rugby"
- Manual and materials available to coaches for player development
- Continue with an external resource to assist Coaches and Managers
- Look to introduce a Coaches Development Plan with predetermined dates for:
 - o Foundation Level 1 / Level 2 / Smart Rugby courses
 - o Train the trainer sessions
 - o Specialist sessions through the season.

Introduction

This report provides an overview of the MJRC Minis (Under 6 - Under 9) 2015 season, including events, issues, and recommendations for 2016.

The Minis Age Group Coordinators (AGCs) for 2015 and the number of teams in each age group were:

- U6: Ed Abbott 3 teams
- U7: Nikki Warburton 5 teams
- U8: Michael Betts 6 teams
- U9: Sean Wiles 7 teams

Special thanks go to the tireless efforts of the AGCs who often go unnoticed and unthanked but without whom many activities involving the Minis would simply not occur. Thanks also go to the numerous managers and coaches for each of the 21 Minis teams this year – again – without their support and dedication 2015 would not have run as smoothly as it did. The children love seeing their parents and friends involved in community sport. As has been previously noted, many years down the track the children may not remember what they received for their birthday/Christmas in any particular year but they will just about always remember who was their coach/manager in any particular year (especially when it was Mum or Dad)!

Finally, and most importantly, thanks to the players for a fantastic Minis 2015 – see you in 2016.

Minis Events 2015

The Mosman Minis kicked off this year with strong registrations in February. Adopting the recommendation from the previous year, the Club provided a comprehensive welcome pack to all parents to welcome all and explain our processes. Teams were announced in mid-March with the Kit Handout/Meet the Team session held at the club's spiritual home, Rawson Oval.

Overall this was a great start to the season – the club funded a sausage sizzle put on by the Seniors, Tah Man came from the Waratahs to get the kids excited and the Club's sponsors and suppliers were in attendance to sell gear and promote their support for the Club.

There were a couple of things to consider for next year, which are noted below in the suggestions for 2016.

We again ran a Coaches and Managers Night with the support of Ken Spellacy, James Jackson and Ready Rugby at Rawson to introduce the coaches and managers to some



practical tips on running the teams. The club also hosted coaching and refereeing courses for all parties to attend during the season.

The conclusion of the Minis rugby season was marked by the Minis Trophy presentation Day, held at Rawson Oval. Spectacular weather helped put on a great end of season finale with all teams playing two mini games in their own age group before being presented with their trophies and awards, then enjoying the jumping castles and the barbecue put on by the Mosman Rugby Club Seniors.



Finally, thanks to Paulina Moncrieff and the U8s for hosting the annual Jeans and Jersey Night at the Rawson Clubhouse earlier in the year. They did a fantastic job in arranging the event. Great food, Waratahs v Brumbies on the big screen and the Piano Man from Minskys all made it a great night out.

Playing Season

All Minis teams' first games this year were a gala day hosted by Hunters Hill at Boronia Park playing against the other Norths village clubs. This was a great start to the season before the traditional Gordon Gala Day hosted by Lindfield at the end of the school holidays. It was encouraging to see the U6s giving it a go with little training, as well as the U8s attempting tackle for the first time. The U7s were able to build on their skills learned the previous year, and it was really terrific seeing U9 players step up to the 10-person game.

At our home games in 2015 at both Balmoral and Rawson, we continued the process adopted in 2014 of having a duty team responsible for ground setup and marshalling and this generally worked very well and should be continued.

Our Minis teams all played the regular season in the Gordon Minis Competition and generally acquitted themselves very well. The players all enjoyed their rugby and the chance to run around with their mates and were very well supported by their coaches and



managers. The standard of rugby played was generally admirable, reflecting on the development and coaching support programs put in place by the Club.

There were some instances of behavioural issues arising from players, officials and supporters, all of which were regrettable and not in the spirit of rugby that the Club supports strongly. Recommendations about these issues are discussed below.

Throughout the year the Minis participated in a number of activities other than the regular Gordon Minis Competition, including

- North Sydney Gala Day Preview to Norths Senior Game U8s
- Harbord Harlequins Gala Day U8s and U9s
- Gordon Village Cup U9s and
- Dufficy Cup U9s.

The Dufficy Cup is hosted by Hunters Hill JRC at the end of the U9 season and is held on a Friday evening pursuant to U10 conditions. This gives those participants an insight into what to expect in the U10s and is a great way to build upon all of the skills the boys have learnt though the Minis. This year Hunters Hill ran two Dufficy Cup tournaments on successive Friday nights and Mosman entered three teams, made up of nominations by the coaches from the seven regular U9 teams:

- The Orcas who played in the first Dufficy Cup and were unlucky to have the eventual winners, Drummoyne, in their pool but won all their other games. The Orcas were also the team that Mosman entered in the Harbord Gala Day where they won their pool but lost in the Semi Final.
- The Minkes who played in the second Dufficy Cup and also came up against the eventual winners, Coogee, in their pool but were otherwise undefeated
- The Humpbacks, who also played in the second Dufficy Cup where they won their pool and then lost to Coogee in the final.

The Gordon Village Cup was a new competition this year hosted by St Ives, using the same format as the Dufficy Cup (U9s playing U10 rules). The Mosman team was a composite of the Minkes and Humpbacks and won all their pool games other than against Hills, the eventual winners.

There was a clear benefit for the U9s this year from all of this additional rugby. Of the 90 or so players in the U9s around 50 were able to be involved in the Harbord, Dufficy and GVC teams. As well as playing in their regular team this meant those players all attended extra training sessions and were exposed to playing with new team members under different coaches. In addition to playing well in these extra teams there was a noticeable lift in the quality of rugby in the regular Saturday teams attributable to this extra exposure.



Congratulations to all the Minis and their parents and supporters for a fantastic season.

Matters Considered During the 2015 Season

1. Pre-Season Training

Traditionally Mosman Minis only have at best one training session before the gala days at the start of the season (often washed out!). This is largely due to restrictions on ground availability because of late finishing cricket activities. Other clubs we play against (such as Chatswood and Lindfield) usually start the season more strongly than Mosman because they have established well-run pre-season training.

Recommendation for 2016 Season

- Confirm with Council availability of grounds for pre-season training sessions
- Run pre-season training sessions that are:
 - Optional to attend (but strongly encouraged)
 - Age-group-based rather than team-based to allow for optional attendance
 - Focused on skill development and enjoyment
 - Commencing once registrations close off i.e. late Feb, and running weekly.

2. Coaching

Following the trial on 2014, in 2015 the Club provided coaching support for Minis coaches in the form of the "Coaches & Managers Night" presented by the club's coaching coordinators and Ready Rugby. We ran different sessions for the U6/U7s and the U8/U9s. A coaching manual was also provided as a guide only and starting point for the coaching team. In addition all coaches were required to be SmartRugby qualified and the Club supported them doing their Foundation courses. There was an attempt during the season to organise a mid-season session for the coaches with the coaching and refereeing coordinators but this proved difficult to coordinate.

Recommendation for 2016 Season

The recommendation is for this support to continue but for it to also be extended in the following ways:

- the coaching coordinators or external resource be invited to Minis training more regularly throughout the season
- place some emphasis on specific techniques such as going in to contact and managing the breakdown (U8s and U9s)
- continue to develop being part of the "coaching team" within the club. It has been found that coaches have learnt a lot throughout the season from discussing matters



with coaches in other teams within that year level. Whether it is at a mid-season catchup session or at the end of training on a Thursday night or in their own time, it is recommended that coaches and AGCs for each age group meet to discuss what is working well or not.

3. Referees

For the first time in 2015 Mosman-based qualified Minis referees operated as part of the Gordon pool of referees. Previously Mosman just ran our own referees for home games. Refs in the pool were able to nominate to officiate at U8 and U9 games throughout the competition. Generally this ran well and thanks to our Referees Coordinator for organising and supporting the referees from Mosman. Special thanks also to Hamish McKay, Jack Jones and Jimmy Greenslade for great service with the whistle. Despite their best efforts there were not always enough referees for our home games and many times parents had to referee U8 or U9 games.

Recommendation for 2016 Season

Encourage older players and parents to take up the whistle and be involved in rugby.

4. Gear Handout Night

As noted above the Gear Handout Night in 2015 was generally a great event. There were some specific learnings from it to be noted for 2016:

Recommendation for 2016 Season

- The process of handing out gear should be more tightly controlled. The Club's Gear Steward should issue the team kit bags and playing gear to the respective AGCs. Team Managers must then get their team's kit bag and playing gear from the AGC and be responsible for handing the kit bag to the coach(es) and the playing gear to the players. Managers should have a sign-on sheet for players' parents to sign out their playing gear, noting the number and any requests for size changes that can be passed back to the AGC to coordinate with the Gear Steward
- Teams in each age group should be notified of specific times that their playing gear will be distributed
- The sound system needs to be operational so effective announcements can be made to a large number of very excited kids! This may be remedied by assembling closer to the clubhouse at Rawson
- There may be scope for more organised activities for the players, e.g. ball passing competition, blow up footie castle, tackle bag area or round robin of Viva7's matches.



5. Behaviour

As noted above there were some incidents in 2015 where players, officials (coach/manager) and supporters behaviour did not meet the standard expected in MJRC, on and off the field. In some cases, reports were made to MJRC from other clubs of inappropriate behaviour by our participants. At a minimum the standard is set out in the NSWRU Code of Conduct. The Club expects that all participants will play, be involved and support rugby in the true spirit of the game.

Recommendation for 2016 Season

- Provide all participants with a reminder of the Code of Conduct and MJRC's expectations prior to the start of the season
- Ensure signage of the Code of Conduct is present at all Mosman home games.

SAMOA TOUR REPORT 2015

We were a tour party of 58. This comprised of 25 players, 31 Whale Watchers and our valued medical team of physio Alex and nurse Jenny. Travelling with us was (at my estimate) some 250kg of boots, rugby jerseys, tee shirts, balls, mouth guards, books, pencils and toys we would leave in Samoa as donations to the local Samoan communities we were to meet along the way.

It's a tough flight to Samoa – arriving at 5:30am after a 5 hour flight. However 'Samoa time' kicks in quickly, and the entire tour party I think adjusted to fit in to the pace of Samoa not long after leaving the airport. Breakfast at luxurious Aggie Grays may have helped.

We were treated to two Kava ceremonies on our first day, full of ritual, speeches and protocol, before we settled into Fao Fao – paradise in a bamboo hut. People who had toured previously described Fao Fao to me and were not able to do it justice – not because of any lack in their powers of description but because it really is indescribable. Once you've been there you'll understand. It is paradise – despite the bamboo huts. Who needs walls and your own bathroom, anyway?





Each match day comprised of a 15-a-side match sandwiched between two 7-a-side matches. This, we thought, would provide us the best opportunity to run our squad of 25 players and allow all boys adequate game time. We did underestimate the injury toll and the energy sapping humidity, and so several boys played a lot of rugby!

Match Day One pitched our boys against Lepa Lotofaga College in 7s and Aleipata Collage in 15s. In our two 7s games, we won 20-15 and 29-5. The 15s was tough – our opposition had not had the benefit of much coaching and so tended to tackle '…like Kamikazes' as I said later (code for hitting high, often). This was our first game as a squad and sadly we succumbed to Aleipata 5-25. It is important to note that our opposition wasn't in any way working to a premeditated plan – they'd never received formal coaching and so knew no other way.

Gladly, the development of a team song back at Fao Fao – quickly overtaken by some enthusiastic parents' karaoke – dispelled any disappointment, and bonded us all for the days ahead.

We were able to relax and spent some time at To Sua. This is a large lava chimney now filled with seawater. It has special religious significance to the local population, and spending time drifting back and forward within the chimney as the tide ebbs and flows does create a sense of, well, awe.

While in Fao Fao we all sauntered in and out of the surf, enjoyed spectacular sunsets, snorkeled around the coral in the lagoon and generally felt a million miles away from civilisation. The local kids came to play and our boys were really special in how they played and swam with these kids – especially the very young ones.

We were lucky enough to be invited to a church service on Sunday. Samoans sing like opera singers – every single last one of them. So church with 50 Samoans is like St Paul's Cathedral with a 500 person choir. In fact every college we played against sang and danced to/for us after our matches. Samoans may not be the most asset rich people, but in terms of the love of life, of spiritualism and of friendship, and of the spirit of generosity, they are the richest people on earth. And did I tell you they can sing??

We left Fao Fao and moved into two hotels in Apia – rooms with walls and even bathrooms we didn't need to share with others that had hot water! We traded the rolling surf for a resort swimming pool – tough, I know, but we all made the effort and pushed through.

Match Day Two pitched us against Falealili College in 7s and Palalaua College in 15s. The abilities of our opponents were of a higher standard but our boys played very well – especially in the 15s. I believe Mosman had not beaten Palalaua in the past. We lost both 7s on day two 12-26 and 17-24 (a game we were in control of with a minute to go), but were



dominant in 15s winning 39-12. These games and the subsequent celebrations were broadcast on Samoan national television news that night

(see this link - https://youtu.be/HjX-H3OHzqw).

We were able to iron out some of the tour aches pains (the boys, too) at Sinalei Reef Resort and Spa (the burdens of foreign travel!) that afternoon before heading back to Apia for (oh no, not) more karaoke at a local restaurant. Who knows Delilah? Magic!

Apia is a sleepy town but the markets are great. I think they had a big week with us in town. The boys enjoyed rock star status after their news feature and everyone was able to walk, shop or just unwind by the pool as the mood took them.

Building strong bonds with the local communities became our mantra and we included the local constabulary in friendship building activity, after celebrating a special birthday in a local bar. We believe the bar owner made more that night than in an average month – everyone was a winner.

Match Day Three was the money ball day – the play off for the Alan Grey Trophy. We played 7s against Leulumoega College (our hosts for the day) before matching our 15s against Samoa's strongest rugby school, St Josephs, in the trophy match. The similarities to Sydney's Joeys were more than just in name. On the day our team's enthusiasm, along with the clinical coaching the boys enjoyed on tour, led to wins in the 7s by 15-10 and 26-5. In the all important Alan Grey trophy match Mosman enjoyed a 17-5 win. These matches were by far the toughest on tour but our boys played a team game like real Australian representatives. Off the field we impressed as well - our boys and coaches responded to Samoan singing with a resounding rendition of Advance Australia Fair.

The awards night was special. This was because the tour was special. Boys and parents, players, coaches and managers, Mums and Dads, sisters, physios, nurses, the Wolf Pack and the 58 travelling tour party – we all blended in to be one very happy group of close friends. The boys behaved impeccably and did their Club, their schools and their suburb proud. The parents mostly did - but alas those stories must stay in Samoa.

"Memories were made that will last a lifetime...". That quote came from one of our 14 year old boys. Every one of them understood the significance of the massive cultural experience they'd been lucky enough to experience and the paradise they'd enjoyed. All 58 of us were blessed to be lucky enough to enjoy this tour – but it was the boys that took the most benefit and built the strongest memories.

BARRACUDAS (CUDAS) TOUR REPORT 2015

When you think of taking 30 boys on a rugby tour all under 12, sleeping in bunkhouses over a 1 week period you tend to reconsider your own perceptions with regard to sanity. You have flashbacks to when you were this age and have visions of water-drenched bedding, short sheeting, trashed rooms, toothpaste facials and the endless list goes on. Reality hits you and, as tour leaders, you look at each other and say "what the (expletive) have we got ourselves into". For the next 9 months this line constantly reverberates in your head and you recount the same lines after each CUDAS meeting.

Over the lead up period you get to know the boys and the parents pretty well. Along the way you make mental notes on those who will give you grief, be disruptive and lead others astray while on tour. This could be due to their behavioural traits, being away from home etc. As tour leaders you consult with each other on how best to manage these individuals. To deal with these issues on our tour we made one Treasurer and the other Clerk of the Court - we chose well!

The tour is however all about the boys and as such, you ensure that along the way you maximise all outcomes, ensuring each boy obtains the most unforgettable experience possible. These experiences all fostered within the team environment with one goal - "Better Boys Make Better Men".

The week before departure you constantly check the weather. A cancelled game day will result in 30 restless boys needing to be entertained...things were not looking great one week out! As such, and as all good catholic tour leaders do, you pray for good weather. Flying out we had not heard from the man above on the weather front, so we were rather anxious.

When you finally arrive and take control of 30 overexcited boys and place them on a bus to the accommodation, it hits you like a sledgehammer. You once again recite the CUDAS Leader moto, "what the (expletive) have we got ourselves into".

As Tour Leaders you prepare yourself for the worst and lay down the law from the very moment the boy's feet hit terra firma at the accommodation. After implementing the yellow card, red card system, we placed our complete trust in the boys to manage each other's behaviour, to foster individual respect for each other, and show complete respect for the Mosman Junior Rugby Club that they were representing. We had a policy, "We're here to have fun, but don't be a fool in the process".

The leaders prayers were also answered with outstanding weather delivered over the tour period. Some may scoff, but they can't refute the marvel bestowed upon us all known as the 2015 CUDAS week!



The daily account while on tour was superbly penned via the daily blog put together by Mike "The Labrador" Boyd and posted on the CUDAS website. As all good leaders do, we have chosen to plagiarise this work for our daily recount.

The Tour Captain & Jersey Handout.

Our selection process for the captain starts way back at the beginning of the CUDAS Tour and runs right up to the Gear Handout night. Over the past 7 months the efforts of every CUDA - their fundraising, their community spirit and service, their effort at training and the respect they have shown for each other - is carefully watched by the Tour Coaches, Leaders and a number of parents. We were also strongly of the view that each player should have a voice. As such, we chose to challenge each CUDA by requesting they prepare a short speech (30 seconds) about "What being a CUDA means to me..." The boys were exceptional with all 30 standing in front of the parent body and delivering well-prepared presentations. Thankfully the airport is small so getting through the airport and onto the bus was pretty quick. The drive to Pinewood too about 20 minutes - we had finally arrived!





A quick Tour Meeting followed and we got our cabins for the week. This was our first proper look at this stunning country from the ground. There was little chat on the bus as the boys were recovering from their first nights sleep and for some of the boys, clearly plucking up some courage to jump!

Luckily for the boys there was also an awesome zip-line that runs alongside the Kawarau River under the Bungy platform.

Seven boys made the jump: Liam, Will S, Finlay, Dylan, Austin, Cooper, and Charlie. A few Whale Watchers had a go too: Craig, Warren, Ken, Mike, Alex and Tom.



A quick lunch break followed back in Queenstown at Speights Bar and Grill, then it was time for the Tour to split. The first points for Mosman came from a barnstorming run by Austin Clarke (CUDA3) who managed to free the ball from his grasp, allowing Ethan Strawbridge (CUDA27) to make the final push over the line. Mosman was up 7-0 thanks to a successful conversion kick from Ben Morton (CUDA18). Alexandria struck back with a try in the 18th minute to narrow the gap.

Again, Alexandria struck back shortly after we had scored, capitalising on a tired back-line after long runs downfield.

The pick of the manoeuvres in the half was the terrific run by Tom Duffy (CUDA6) and Hugo Kerr (CUDA14) that resulted in Henry crossing for a great try in the corner. Seven minutes

later Henry crossed again after a run by Josh Johnston (CUDA11) moved the ball across the field and back again. The score by now was 34-10 with about 11 minutes of the game to go. Then one of the hardest working backs on the Tour, Will Spellacy (CUDA26) copped a very high tackle, and as we have come to expect Coach Martyr dashed onto the field with words of encouragement and support. Unfortunately for Will, it was a nasty knock and his game was done.



A flurry of points were piled on in the dying minutes with Mosman crossing twice - Lachie Reynolds crossing under the posts making Charlie's conversion a doddle and one of our big



props Matt Theunissen (CUDA29) crossing for his first try of the tour. Mosman leading Alexandria 46-10 as the clouds rolled in and the rain began to fall.

Alexandria crossed again as the scoreboard ticked down to 0:00:00 and following a failed conversion, the final score was 46-15. Mosman had secured The BARRA Cup! The afternoon had begun very well. A quick speech from the Club Chairman and a vote of thanks from Tour Captain Charlie Boyd and we were ready for Game 2 to commence.

Recommendations: Earlier emails to the MJRC database coupled with greater involvement from the AGC's in promoting and selling tickets across the age group they represent would definitely yield more ticket sales. A total event target of 170 – 180 tickets should be considered par.

The free drink on entry with ticket purchase continues to be a good initiative however an all-inclusive drinks and food ticket price might need to be looked at as well. Free tickets for new parents to the club, might also be a good way of increasing parent attendance across the youngest and newest age groups as well as helping to facilitate new social relationships.

CUDAS Lunch Friday May 22

CUDAS Lunch 2015, once again lived up to its reputation as one of the major MJRC social events of the year. The decision last year to hold the lunch at the SCG was again opted for this year, however the brand new Noble Dining Room was chosen over the Steve Waugh trophy room.

Financially the lunch was a great success with a \$39K profit result achieved on the back of 315 tickets being sold (a 25% improvement on 2014). Recommendations: The Gilbert Rugby ball raffle on each table needs to be run more effectively. The appointment of a few more helpers to co-ordinate participation in the raffle and the collection of funds would be appropriate.

The CUDAS touring video should be shown after the President's speech and shouldn't be more than 4 minutes in duration.

A bus transport option from the SCG back to Mosman, as part of ticket purchase via the trybooking page would be a worthwhile consideration.

In future each CUDA family must be responsible for selling at least one table of tickets to the lunch. This was one of the stipulations for the 2015 Tour and gave the Lunch organisers greater certainty around final numbers and therefore could plan appropriately.



MJRC Ball Saturday July 25

Black Tie Masquerade was chosen as this year's theme for the Annual MJRC Ball and as mentioned earlier, it was held at the SCG in the Noble Dining Room. Emma Souter, who was a late call up to the position and who supported myself in the role of Chair of the Ball Committee, did a brilliant job in producing a fantastic event. Another Emma, Emma Delany, was also an integral part of the team and was in charge of decoration and prizes.





Emma Delaney's team of decorators created a fantastic Masquerade themed room and her team of ticket sellers did a great job throughout the evening. Emma D's innovative 'Wall of Masks' sold out within the first hour of the night and her silent auction was equally a great success and raised in excess of \$6,000 in sales. Thanks must also go once again to Diana Kahui, who was an invaluable part of the team in her role as treasurer. Well done and heart-felt thanks to these 3 ladies and their respective teams, on a superb job.



We were also lucky to secure Owen Finnegan as MC after seeing him in action as a panelist at the CUDAS lunch and he did a very good job.





Thanks should also go to long term MJRC supporters, CBA Private, for once again sponsoring the Ball and to all the other sponsors and supporters who provided prizes for the event.

Recommendations: The price of the Ball ticket needs to be considered next year given it was the same price as the CUDAS Lunch ticket. The decision this year to add the option of bus transport to and from the SCG was however a great idea and should continue in the future.

The Ball Committee generally and in particular the Chairperson, needs to work closely with the Events Cocoordinator, and be willing and able to provide regular and informative feedback. More specifically, transparency around major financial decisions will ensure that the best, cost benefit decisions are achieved.

A digital silent auction platform such as 'Galabid' must be used instead of hand written sheets in the future. This will not only allow the auction items to be advertised and actively marketed in club communications well before the evening, it will also produce a much higher overall \$ result. It will also allow a wider audience to participate in the auctions well before the actual event and during the event whether or not they are in attendance. Additionally, collection and reconciliation of winning bidders funds at the conclusion of the action is automatic and far easier than the manual method. Where possible, the actual physical auction items should however still be on display on the night.

The decision to only have a DJ this year was a good one, given the very high direct and associated costs of having a band and the relatively short period of time that they actually perform for.

The date of the Ball needs to be carefully considered especially in regards to the timing of School Holidays as well as any major School events such as dinners and fundraisers, which might possibly conflict with the Ball. Selection of the Ball date should be made as early as



possible following a review of these things as well as available booking dates on the SCG calendar. Communication to relevant Schools about the chosen Ball date might also be prudent. 'Save the Date' emails should also be sent out as early as possible to the database.

In future, each Age Group Coordinators should be given the responsibility and accountability of selling tickets across their age group; 2 tables for U6 to U12 and 1 table for U13 – U16s. The sale of Ball tickets at training nights should be considered in conjunction with the use of MJRC's wireless handheld payment devices. As mentioned before, this will assist greatly with planning and catering for the event.









MJRC Outdoor Cinematic Experience in November or Early December 2015

At the time of writing this report, the Inaugural MJRC Movie night was in the early stages of organisation. With a target attendance of 750+, the event will be advertised as a community event and open to the general public. The night is planned to be held on Rawson Oval, commencing at approximately 5.00pm potentially with the screening of a kids movie followed by a second family friendly movie from 7pm. Tickets to the event will be available for sale through the Trybooking portal.

Some of the initiatives being considered include a jumping castle, rides and face painting as well as various food stalls and a coffee cart, in conjunction with the Club operating the BBQ and bar. Event sponsorship opportunities will also be up for grabs. Lets hope the weather co-operates with our plans!!

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the organisation of this year's MJRC events. It has been an absolute pleasure working with so many enthusiastic, passionate and talented volunteers. Thanks also to the wonderful parents and friends of MJRC who have supported the Club by way of their attendance and generosity at these events.

Finally, on a personal note, I have decided to step down from the Committee as well as retiring from coaching, after being involved in this great Club for the past 7 years.
