PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2020

2020 has certainly been a year to remember for MJRC.

Navigating through the uncertainty of COVID-19, adapting to social distancing rules, and adjusting to the 'new normal' that we all find ourselves in. It has been challenging, however, Mosman Junior Rugby club was able to adapt and rise to these challenges and have a very successful 2020.

A great deal of hard work and planning went into this year's season, and without the efforts of our Committee, and all of our volunteer coaches and AGCs, we would have been unable to get our kids back on the field to play for Mosman Junior Rugby Club this season once Government rules allowed.

I would like to thank Club Secretary Andrew Brown for being our nominated COVID officer to deal with this ever changing COVID environment and for advising our Committee on how to comply with COVID rules and regulations. I would also like to thank our parent group and supporters for following these rules and regulations and the support of the Committee and myself for pushing ahead with rugby trainings and then getting back to the regular season. A massive positive out of this year has been that we have started "live streaming" all Junior games at Rawson Oval on Friday Nights and Sunday mornings. A big thanks to Mark Evans for organising this for MJRC and for his amusing and exciting commentary. We had viewers from as far away as Dubai, London, Memphis, LA and country Qld and Vic.

Despite the challenges of the season it has been one of the most successful to date for the club. Below are some highlights.

- 1. Registrations numbers have grown 10% from 2019 year on year. We are now one of the largest Minis and Junior Rugby Clubs in Australia. Erika Von Arnim does an amazing job working with all age groups to ensure our registrations and compliance with SJRU rules.
- 2. MJRC girls tackle sevens program is up and running with teams in u 12/14/16. This is so pleasing to see our Girls program developing so quickly and a major opportunity for growth in registration numbers.
- 3. MJRC is providing fantastic coaches for our club via our "coach the coaches sessions" and provision of external coaches in the older age groups u 13+
- 4. MJRC has created a volunteer culture with more and more parents involved in all areas of the club in 2020. Especially our BBQ and Canteen volunteers led by Emily Raper.
- 5. Skill development of our players from Mini thru to Juniors is continuing to improve
- 6. Strong Mini player numbers. Minis are the future of MJRC and a big focus of the 2020 committee to get the experience right for players and parent group
- 7. Retention of players in our u 13/14/15 age groups by offering coaching structures which grow the skills of our players.
- 8. Our Referee Program led by Rob McKay is unique to Mosman and provides a pathway for young refs to get involved in the game. MJRC had its first female ref with Charlotte Sparkes this year.

MJRC is one of the largest rugby clubs in Australia with 45 teams playing in 2020. We have been fortunate to have Nick Bousie as our Director of Coaching in 2020. Nick has been instrumental in improving the clubs coaching structures and has done a fantastic job in providing programs and mentoring to our volunteers and paid coaches across all age groups. Big thank you to Nick for a job well done over the past year.

I would also like to thank Nathan Davis who Managed the Girls Rugby program. The "Tiger Sharks" skills and playing numbers continue to go from strength to strength. Our girls are performing very well in all age groups u 12/14/16. We also have an extremely dedicated coaching group in our girls program. Nick Higgins was awarded Girls coach of the year in 2020. Girls Rugby is a major opportunity to grow playing numbers at Mosman and continue to be a big focus of the club.

Our Minis benefited greatly from the committees focus on coaching and skill development. I would like to thank Mini Co-ordinator Drew Stores for his hard work in co-ordinating the Minis program. Playing numbers were the largest they have been for some time. We have a wonderful group of u 6/7 age groups who are developing a love of rugby. There

were no Gala days for our u 8/9 this year due to COVID, however both these age groups are very strong and will provide a great cohort of players coming into the Junior program in coming years. This will enable Mosman to continue to be one of the few clubs to field 3 teams in the u 10/11 age groups. Henry Bateman (Club Treasurer) was also Coach of the Year for our Minis in 2020. Its passionate and commitment to his u 9 team was apparent for all to see.

Due to COVID there were no Finals for our junior teams this year. Mosman played however in the 10A/11A/12A SJRU competition. We also field 3 teams in our u 10 and u 11 age groups. Two teams in u 12 and one team in U13/14/15 age groups. Our U16 players were part of a Vikings JV. Mosman Junior Rugby continues to attract and retain significant numbers of players across all age groups.

I am very proud of the way that MJRC junior teams found a way to train during the COVID lock down and continue fitness and skill developments. It is also fantastic to see the retention of players into our older age groups. Our Juniors are fortunate to be led by a fantastic group of talented coaches.

The Juniors coach of the year was the u 12 Whales Coach and NSJRU president and MJRC committee member – Dave Scammell. Dave is a passionate and driven coach. He loves a scrum machine and hard work. Over the years Dave has been heavily involved in coaching multiple age groups and we thank him for all his dedication to MJRC.

The Club coach of the year was the u 13 Whales Assistant Coach – Paul Dearlove. Paul has coached this team for the past few season and done a wonderful job developing these players. He has a considered approach to coaching and drives for excellence. He has passed on his years of experience as a player to these boys. We are very fortunate to have him as a coach at MJRC.

I would like to also congratulate the Clubman of the Year for 2020 – Nathan Davis.

Nathan Davis is not only a member of the MJRC Committee, Nathan is our Girls Rugby Co-ordinator and Sponsorship Manager. Nathan energy is unbelievable and infectious. You can see him bouncing around on training nights and on the side lines with a big smile and plenty of enthusiasm. He has helped drive the Girls Rugby 7's for the past two years. In his role as Sponsorship Manager, Nathan is relentless in managing these relationships and ensuring that our club remains financially strong.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT 2020

As expected, the 2020 winter season was greatly impacted by COVID-19. Despite the issues and the shortened season, the players, parents and club all still managed to have an incredible time once it got underway again, resulting in a successful season overall.

The 4th MJRC Try Rugby Day, scheduled to be held on 9th Feb 2020, was rained out, and due to COVID restrictions thereafter was unable to be rescheduled. This greatly impacted the uptake of our registrations, especially for the 'new' families who like to come and see what MJRC is about before signing up. Overall registration in our younger age groups (U6 particularly) was very slow to begin with, but ended in a similar ball park to previous years.

Rugby Xplorer was again utilised as the registration system and game management system for the Juniors XVs competition throughout the year. A smoother registration process being the 2nd year of use.

The season was officially due to commence on the weekend of 27/28/29th March 2020 but this was pushed back until COVID restrictions allowed contact sport again on weekend of 26th July 2020. Training was a staged return resuming for fitness and no-contact training in early June returning to full training in July when the competition resumed.

Initially due to COVID we had a lag in registration numbers, but after school sport and other activities were heavily affected by restrictions, we saw a pick up in numbers. Parents advised they wanted their kids to get game time and they no longer had the clash with school sport. This was particularly evident in the U12 to U15 age groups who are normally affected by school sport on a larger scale.

The final numbers of registrations for 2020 are shown in Table 1 below.

In total there were 561 registered players in 2020. This was split by:

- 169 players Minis (U6 to U9)
- 213 players Juniors (U10 to U15)
- 91 players Tackle 7s girls (within the Sizzling, Frosty & Spring 7s comps)
- 70 players Tackle 7s boys (for the Spring 7s comp as @30/10/20)

Unlike previous years, a formal girls winter touch competition was not run this year.

The Minis fielded 16 teams and the Junior boys had 11 teams in the XVs Competition in 2020. Our U16 Boys joined a JV with Forest as we had 4 interested players and the grandfathered Shoreman team did not go ahead.

The Girls 7s fielded a total of 8 MJRC teams in 3 different 7s competitions:

3 teams in the Sizzling 7s competition (U12, U14 & $\underline{16}$)

3 teams in the Frosty 7s competition (2x U12 and 1x U14)

2 teams in the Spring 7s competition (1x U12 and 1x 14)

The U16s played in a JV for Frosty and Spring 7s with Forest. So there were no Mosman teams for this age group in these comps, but there were players.

MINIS

In the Minis this year, U/6 had a total of 31 players broken into 3 teams. This was only 4 players down from the previous year, and tremendous result given the COVID environment the club was up against. Under 7 had a total of 42 players broken into 4 teams, again only 3 players down from the previous year. Under 8 had a total of 48 players broken into 5 teams, the same figure as the previous year, and Under 9, 48 players broken into 4 teams, again the same number as the previous year. Taking into account these figures, MJRC once again was able to put forward the largest Mini's Sydney based club.

The SJRU rule for U7s player wishing to play up in U8s, by completing a mandatory dispensation form, was implemented and followed well this year. Having the AGC support and understanding assisted greatly. 12 players selected to play 'up'. All parents completed the necessary forms. However, this is a large contingent to consider moving forward especially as they approach U10 and U11s, with the introduction of representative development squads.

JUNIORS – XVs Competition

In the Juniors, there were 231 registrations for the winter XVs competition. An overall increase of 1 player from 2019. This was seen across all age groups, however it was mainly felt in our U15s (having to form a JV in order to field a team) and the lack of any U16s team.

Despite COVID-related issues with the season, SJRU mandated further Rugby Xplorer processes be followed for the Juniors XVs winter competition, making a significant increase in Xplorer Admin required as it is a manual process to select all teams, and to check Managers, ARs and Ground Marshalls accreditations and to add them individually to correct teams.

Early on in the year, capping some Junior squad numbers became an issue, and this continued for some age groups (namely U12 and above) as they struggle with too many players for 1 (or 2 teams) but not enough for a 2nd or 3rd team. This was also compounded by increase in interest and numbers in these age groups due to lack of school sport and less school clashes/less injuries during COVID restrictions. Would recommend setting Club guidelines for this for future years for consistency and transparency.

MJRC continues to have a good working relationship with SJRU, with constant open dialogue with the SJRU Competition Managers (John Glen and Andrew Hutton). Over all SJRU did a great job running the competition, making all necessary grade/draw/zone changes multiple times in accordance with the ever-changing Government regulations, and maintaining game standards, considering the affect COVID-19 had on the resources at NSW Rugby.

Grading:

Initial grading was requested as per Table 2 below, however due to COVID-19, all community sport was moved to a 'zoned' competition and changed several times to comply with government regulations.

SJRU advised initially that they will continue to grade A and B grade comps, and be allocating the remaining teams into regionally based competitions. But with changing Government regulations, most 'grades' and competitions were again changed to zones, with the exception of our U10 A grade team, who remained largely in their original draw.

The final 'zoned' competitions meant that some of our teams who have traditionally been graded highly, were in a more competitive competition and in turn, increased the enthusiasm and enjoyment experienced by players, coaches and parents. This coupled with the decreased distanced travelled was very well received by all.

There were some 'three-way' games scheduled for our U11 Sharks (Orange Zone) to accommodate an uneven ladder, and was created to ensure no team had a bye and missed out playing for even one weekend. Some parents provided

feedback to say this was not their preferred way forward should the need for it again occur, as the team who needed to play 2 games back to back, were often far too exhausted by the time the second (fresh) team begin playing and they ended the day being beaten by much larger margains and did nothing for team morale, despite possibly winning the first game.

Note: Suggest requesting no higher than B grade for any of our Whales teams, with the exception possibly of this year's U10s. Individual conversations with each AGC need to be held prior to submitting requested grades with SJRU. This was not done well prior to submission this year. SJRU also gave submissions precedence over performance (for example; when Seaforth U11B won their comp in 2019, were given B grade again after they requested that grade, despite the wider understanding they would immediately be taken up a grade after winning that competition the previous year).

*Ladder placing is not accurate due to the number of draw and grade changes. Rugby Xplorer still shows teams in the multiple grades played and none of the ladders have been accurately updated by SJRU to reflect all changes made.

SJRU Size for Age:

SJRU mandated that all Junior player's height and weight needed to be verified by the President or Registrar for each club, after it was noted that some clubs last season had not input the correct data, which affected the Size for Age process and meant some players were not flagged for assessment as they should have been.

After the purchase of a height machine, all player's data was taken at their respective training sessions in the 2 weeks leading up to the deadline of 3rd June 2020. With the help of some parent volunteers each evening, I was able to have the players come in one at a time to take their data. The Girls 7s were also measured, with girls coming one at a time, to respect the fact they may not want their details shared out loud. It should be noted that some of the boys were also sensitive to this process. I would suggest that measurements be taken in an area where players can enter one at a time, or data is not called out in front of all the team.

MJRC had no players who were above the height and weight parameters, but did have 3 players who were below the height and weight parameters. Given the changed season due to COVID, no mandatory assessments were undertaken to my knowledge.

Juniors Incidents and Injury report:

MJRC had 2 yellow cards and 0 red cards logged against players throughout this season. Yellow cards were in 1x U12 and 1x U14 Boys.

No serious injuries reported in Xplorer. This continues to be a major concern with the Xplorer registration system as all suspected concussions that did occur during the season were not properly reported, nor was a serious injury that occurred in the U15s on Sunday 30 August, resulting in major knee surgery. There was also one documented case of a concussion and all appropriate return-to-play processes were followed with a successful return to rugby for the player in the U13s.

This is an aspect that the Club needs to keep in mind moving forward. Suggest the Club keep an injury register to monitor concussions and return to play protocols, in accordance with our home-ground First Aid reports to capture both home and away issues.

No players were required to appear before the SJRU Judiciary this season. The U10s had an altercation brought before the Judiciary, due to parent and official behaviour at a match against the U10 Blacktown team, at their home ground. At the time of this report, the incident (whilst initially addressed by SJRU) has not been before the Judiciary and has not received a final outcome. One MJRC U10 parent is awaiting final ruling on his part in this altercation.

Finals:

No Finals rounds were held this year, due to the shortened COVID affected season. SJRU's policy was to get as many games and as much game time for all players as possible. This meant that having any Finals rounds, whereby teams are eliminated and cannot play, was not included.

PRESENTATION DAY:

Again, due to COVID restrictions an official presentation day was not held.

The committee had decided to continue with Awards and Team Photos this season, as it was decided that these mementos are important for the kids, some of whom had missed out on so much this year already. Team photos were booked for the last main home-game day in the season for both the minis and the Juniors.

Andrew Brown, Club Secretary, negotiated a new digital-only package with the current photographer, Advanced Image, reducing the club cost significantly. In keeping with COVID restrictions, team photos were split into two separate days:

• Minis Photo Day at Balmoral on Saturday 12th September

This enabled the flow of people for social distancing, and was met with a pleased parent body, many saying this new format worked well, especially on a day were most teams had a home game at Balmoral. Photographs were taken outside, and the flow of teams in and out worked well. Mini team managers were given their team trophies and all held their own small team presentation at a time suitable to each team.

• Juniors & Girls Photo Day at Rawson on Sunday 20th September

Team photos were taken in the Rawson clubhouse. Scheduling was a bit tricky given 4 teams had a home games at Rawson that day, and 5 teams had to juggle away games with photos at Rawson (an additional 4 teams had no game on Sunday as they had played on Friday night or Saturday). The Boys U14s & Boys U16 JV players chose not to have an official team photo. The referees were also unable to have a photo on this day due to their officiating schedule on the day.

Juniors team Mangers were all given their medals and trophies at the time of team photos, with many teams then holding their own small presentation at the end of their game (as this was the final round in their season).

A special mention and thank you must be made to Sydney Awards and Trophies, who were able to turn around the majority of the work ordered in 2 weeks (normally a 6 week lead time is required). They continue to be very supportive of the club and were willing to add medals/trophies last minute as required.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2020

The 2020 financial year resulted in a net deficit of (\$28,686) (unaudited) to the club (deficit FY2019 \$50,994). As at 30 September 2020 the club is in a strong financial position thanks to our players and valued sponsors – Ray White Mosman, InvestSMART, Richard Cooke Constructions, Design & Construct, Harris Farm, Olympus Sports, The Buena, Charcoal Charlies Mosman, SydneySlice and Vision Fitness Mosman.

Due to focussed efforts by the committee, registration numbers were strong with a registration revenue of FY2020 \$232,90 (unaudited) vs FY2019 \$215,391. This lift in revenue was a result of an increase in the registration fees and also a stabilisation of the registration numbers.

Total Rugby revenue has decreased by FY2020 \$238,565(unaudited) vs FY2019 of \$245,181 due to a combination of reasons including the usual annual events such as cocktail parties and other fund raising activities not being undertaken due to COVID 19 restrictions.

We continued to have a full season cost of a Director of Rugby and increased costs of running the summer Touch competition. Better efforts were made to manage our player kit costs with the club no longer providing a jersey each year for kids U10 upwards which resulted in a savings.

As at 30 September 2020 the club had cash at hand available of \$422,790 which includes BT Investment Fund and primary bank accounts within CBA. The increase in cash balances was mostly attributable to an increase in current assets. A note is that Other Asset Category has reduced from \$77,274 to \$4,448. This is due to the recognition of prepayments towards playing kit. In September 2019 there were prepayments made towards the 2020 kit which were then expensed in the 2020 accounts which also explains the increased Kit Apparel expense line. As noted above better efforts are being made towards our Kit management and no such prepayments have been recorded in 2020. For the 2020/2021 year the club is expecting a further deficit as a result of the continuous strategic efforts to develop and improve the coaching of our players and to promote rugby in our club and the community. The forecast deficit is expected to have a minor impact on the financial strength of the club as the club has accumulated surpluses mostly held in bank accounts.

The club has completed the transfer of accounts to Xero accounting system and has appointed a bookkeeper on a part time basis to ensure that we give greater visibility and understanding of the cash inflows and outflows.

The draft audited financial report will be presented at the club's Annual General Meeting and will be lodged with the Department of Fair Trading. The financial report is available to members upon request to the club's secretary.

DIRECTOR OF COACHING REPORT 2020

The year 2020 has now drawn to a close. It has been like never before. It started like any other year with a great Preseason of Family Fitness and Coach-Education sessions throughout February. The introduction of the new Pathway Program designed explicitly for our U10. It was a very successful program and certainly achieved what we set out to do. We enjoyed two pre-season outings against Seaforth and Newport. We were all set for another External trial mid-March after several internal training sessions when our season came to a shuddering halt on March 18th.

This was when we had to think outside of the ordinary and come up with a unique way of keeping both kids and coaches engaged. Some great initiatives were implemented through the 8-10 weeks that we could not see any of the teams. The gladiator challenge was well-received across the teams, as was the "wrecktangle" and the Skills training that were online for all to practice. At-home training programs were written, and distribute to all ages, and a weekly message to players was sent to club members.

We were allowed back on the paddock in mid-May and could only do basic handling for around 4-6 weeks. Although challenging at the time I believe it gave all coaches an excellent opportunity to work on the basics of catch and pass. This was reflected later in the season with our skill execution of catch and pass improve like never before. When we were finally given the green light to train normally but in smaller groups around June it allowed all; coaches to start building teams in the anticipation that the season will start. This was a tricky period give all the differing views and restriction our coaches were asked to adhere to. To their credit they did a fantastic job. The teams trained through all through the holidays. We had a trial against Lindfield in the week leading up to Round 1.

On July 26th, we started the abbreviated season on nine rounds. The divisions and grades were slightly altered due to the restrictions.

The team of coaches enjoyed many successes both on and off the field in 2020. The introduction of the coach cards was rolled out, and although very simple to follow it was still problematic for all coaches to follow the plan. The overall results for the season were much improved from the previous years, a winning percentage increase from 22% in 2017 to 47% in 2018 and 66% in 2019 to a wonderful level of 76%.

I believe we have the best possible coaches of any club in Sydney. They have all done a fantastic job of developing our boys and girls. My approach to coaching some years ago cantered around the development of the basic skills. The coaches are delivering this to all teams, which is leading to a great style of rugby. I acknowledge all coaches for your efforts in helping drive my passion for rugby skill development and Fun.

Minis Coach of the Year:

Henry Bateman

Henry has worked very hard over the past two years coaching the U8 and the U9 Whales and Gala Day teams. He coaches with great passion and drive. The players have all responded to his style of coaching, and he has certainly prepared them well for that step into full-field and graded teams next year. Always

one of the first at training and the last to leave. We are very lucky to have him working with our mini teams.

Junior Coach of the Year:

Dave has been part of this project over the past four years. GIRLS 7s TACKLE RUGBY 2020

Sydney Junior Rugby Union's Girls' 7s Rugby program is a Sydney based program made up of three separate competitions run over the calendar year: Sizzling 7s from February to April; Frosty 7s from July to September and Spring 7s from October to November. Each competition is 6-8 weeks in duration and is played each Saturday afternoon in a gala day format with players from all over Sydney meeting at the one location to play teams from all over the city.

Building on our success from last year, 2020 was our second year involved in the program and we could not have been prouder of the efforts of our teams.

This year as a club we doubled our participation of girls playing 7s rugby with an incredible registration drive at the beginning of the season. This resulted in MJRC fielding an U12s, U14s and our first U16s team for Sizzling 7s.

While the Sizzling 7s competition was cut two games short due to the breakout of COVID-19, there is no doubt that those first 5 weeks of tackle got the girls excited because when the Frosty 7s competition kicked off in late July, MJRC was one of only three clubs to field 2 x U12 teams, plus we also had an expanded U14s team and formed a JV team with Forest for our U16 team – the Foreman.

With Spring 7s about to kick-off, the success of MJRC's girls' program is in full flight with Mosman entering an U12 and an U16 JV team into the competition for the first time.

<u>U12s</u>

After an incredibly successful Sizzling 7s where we managed to get through 90% of the competition before COVID shut down play, the girls hit the training paddock in late May in preparation for the upcoming Frosty 7s competition.

With enthusiasm at record levels after good Sizzling performances, we increased our numbers in the U12s and managed to field two teams in the U12s Frosty 7s competition. We had 18 girls representing MJRC in the U12s from year 5 through to year 7 from all different schools across the lower north shore.

The season saw us play from Whalan Reserve at Mount Druitt, to Keirle Park in Manly, up to Pittwater Rugby Fields at Warriewood. Despite the threat of disruption from COVID, the SJRU did a great job keeping the comp rolling by splitting us into North and West zones in the last few rounds which brought us closer to home for the last few weeks. Within the North Zone, Mosman was one of only two clubs fielding two team's week in, week out. This is a credit to our players and parents who made an effort to be available every Saturday afternoon to play for their teammates and represent their club.

Of the 26 games our girls played, we won 14 and drew 2. Each and every game the girls gave it their all and continued to improve week in, week out. Our experienced players encouraged our new-comers and it wasn't long before all our players were showing skills beyond their playing years. It is a credit to their enthusiasm, and just as importantly our coaches, how far our girls have come in two seasons (and only months, for some!). Our girls were incredibly nimble, fast and worked together beautifully. They tackled hard, worked well as a team and shared the tries amongst themselves as their love for "the game they play in heaven" grew each and every match.

A special mention must go to our award winners for Season 2020. While it was very difficult to single out individual players due to how far all our girls have come and how well they have all played during the year, our selected players were worthy winners:

A huge shout out to **Nick Higgins** and **Bill Segaert** for coaching the girls and teaching them lifelong rugby skills. Also, a very big thank you to **Julie Sparks** who was incredible in keeping the girls focussed off the field, counting the try-scorers on it, and making sure they turned up to training on time while also keeping their TikTok exploits to a minimum in between matches!

The U12s look forward to another season of 7s rugby in late October with the SJRU's Spring competition.

The U14s had a wonderful winter season with a bunch of girls who thoroughly enjoyed playing and developing their rugby skills together.

We had a tight knit bunch of girls from 5 different schools, who were assisted at varying stages throughout the season with some help from u12s. The highlight of the season was a hard-fought victory over our Battle of the Bridge nemesis, Seaforth, late in the season, after suffering a heavy defeat at our gala day. By the end of the season all the girls had a firm grip on all aspects of the game: from tackling; to work at the break down; to backing each other up; and scoring plenty of tries! U6s REPORT 2020

It was a challenging start for the U6's. A lot of the families were new to rugby, didn't know what to expect with the uncertainty of the Covid pause in training/games and no one knew if the season would go ahead. The parents were patient waiting for answers and a start date for returning to rugby. There were a couple of emails from parents asking about refunds IF the season didn't go ahead but after some reassurance, no one chose to withdraw.

We ended the season with 31 players, plus another who registered and paid but never turned up after the Covid break (with no explanation as to why). We had no withdrawals due to Covid and 3 late registrations in July.

We grouped the children together into 3 teams and then needed to recruit parent volunteers to coach on Thursdays instead of Nick due to a cap on group numbers. The Sharks and Dolphins had volunteers straight away but the Whales team struggled to find a coach until the parent of a late rego put his hand up. There were a number of factors for this. 3 of the Dads already coached older age group teams, several were completely new to rugby and the remainder had work commitments that did not allow them to get to Thursday training.

Nick ran two coaching education sessions for U6 & U7 parents at the end of July. We had a good turn out from the U6's and it really increased parent confidence and involvement. Especially for the Whales team who then ended up with three coaches.

The boys and girls had a short but enjoyable season. Attendance at training and games was very high. Nick provided the coaches a session plan for the first few weeks. Training was a mixture of drills and games to build a foundation of skills (passing/tipping/defending/offside). Despite how challenging it can be coaching U6's, the sessions all seemed well organised and great fun for the kids.

The feedback I got from the parents was that the U6's really enjoyed their introduction to rugby. 20 signed up for an extra couple of games at the end of the season against Norths, led by the Sharks coaches and the majority of players have signed up for summer touch, plus quite a few new children. I am hoping that we will be able to build on those numbers next season as they go into U7's.

Thank you so much to the coaches and managers who were nearly all new to their roles. It was a tricky season to start as a new club member and the time and effort they put into their teams really helped the season run successfully.

U9s REPORT 2020

The U9s had a strong registration totalling 49 players, many of whom were returning players from 2019. It was pleasing to see new families join and assimilate so well into the club. Unfortunately, there were two withdrawals due to Covid-19.

A strategy for the players this year involved mixing the existing 2019 teams around to give them the opportunity to play alongside different players. These new team allocations were important as it gave players exposure to different skillsets and prepares them for grading that occurs in U10s as teams are selected based on player capabilities. Overall this was well received by the playing group and we saw improvements in individual players as a result.

After a prolonged break from Rugby and then a significantly shortened season, it was a credit to the players that they returned in the positive manner they did. Head of Coaching, Nick Bousie and Paul Bellantonio, did a terrific job in providing at home exercises for the players during the Govt enforced lockdown.

Building on the tackling that was introduced last year, positions – Forwards and Backs, was the key learning in 2020. Once the players knew their positions, Forward and Back 'Captains' were assigned enabling Coaches to be gradually removed from the field and provide direction from the sideline. This takes time to develop and while we would have benefited from a full season there was significant improvement in later Rounds. Importantly the foundations have been set for the players to take these skills into U10s.

Coaches observations indicated that it is tactically important to be able to quickly identify and adjust individual roles in order achieve positive game outcomes. Also, going through drills that allow players to respond to/avoid tactics employed by known opposition teams, e.g. 'the ball stripper' or 'the always offsider', etc have been helpful lessons throughout the season.

Quite separately, a very useful contribution to our Coaches this season was the filming of games by some very talented parents. Feedback from the Coaches found that having the ability to review plays post the game was very helpful. How times have changed!

Mid-season the players participated in a Gala day selection process involving a series of skills sessions and internal contested trials. The games were highly competitive as the boys played with grit and great spirit. It was disappointing for them that the Gala tournaments were eventually cancelled, however the club was able to organise two invitational games against North Pirates and Seaforth. Mosman lost one and won one amidst terrible weather conditions under lights at Rawson Oval. Mosman 'Blues' were the proud recipient of the inaugural 'The Shoreman Shield' Mosman vs North Pirates U9s comp.

A huge thank you must go to our dedicated Coaches and Team Managers for the time and energy they put into training and managing our players and everything else you did to make the season run so smoothly.

U10s REPORT 2020

The 2020 Rugby season was a season like no other. We began the year well, with Nick Bousie's well experienced pregrading training schedule, to prepare the boys for the up and coming grading matches. And then COVID-19 threw a spanner in the works. All sport was shut down, and home training began.

Nick Bousie organised two set home training plans for the boys to participate in (1) Gladiator Challenge, whereby the boys and girls participated in core and strength exercises and (2) The Wrecktangle, which was fitness and speed training.

Our winter 2020 season was rebooted from the 15th May under strict COVID-19 protocols, and thus began a long awaited training session with no contact (no rucks, mauls, tackling or scrums), all sporting equipment to be pre/post washed, hand sanitisers used before and after training. But the boys were ecstatic to be back at training.

When finally the season began for a total of 9 rounds, the boys were geared up and ready.

The U10 Whales had a very enjoyable and rewarding season in 2020. Their aim this season was to play fast, running rugby and to improve on one facet of play each week. Steve Smith believed they achieved this goal and it certainly showed in their results. Suffering a first up loss to a very physical Blacktown Scorpions side 41-5, the boys regrouped, trained hard and started playing as a team, resulting in four big wins against Easts, Hills, Harbord and Newport. They were at a crossroads in round 6 as their next four games were against teams we believed we could beat, so we requested a rematch against Blacktown Scorpions. This was unheard of from a Mosman team but the boys were up for it and in a very tough physical sometimes brutal contest at Grantham Park we unfortunately were beaten 21-19. Nik Ruparel, Cameron Douglass and Steve Smith could not have been more proud of the effort and spirit in which the Whales played the game. The never say die attitude and belief the team had in themselves was amazing. Following the narrow loss to Blacktown the boys convincingly beat Wahroonga, Dural and Lindfield in their remaining three games. Their final match was a friendly against a fired up Clovelly Eagles side who they beat 48-0 under lights at Rawson. All up a great season for the Whales. The year 2020 commenced in March with close to 30 boys eager and ready to play for the mighty U15 Mosman Whales. The squad is a broad mix of boys from the local area as well as boarders from one of the Sydney private schools. Some of the boys have been playing since 2010 at Mosman (as 4/5 year olds playing 2 years of U6s) so 2020 was going to be a big year.

With great anticipation the boys trained hard with Lawrance in March with a view to competing in some trial games in mid-late March 2020 and the competition proper starting in early April.....as we all know that never eventuated due to Coronavirus.

Despite many attempted and threatened starts and stops (including training), the boys eventually got onto the pitch in mid-July for a truncated 9 Round season. Thanks go to the club along with the SJRU for making this happen and in the end 9 Rounds was not bad considering a usual season is 14 rounds over a much longer time period.

It must be said that despite all the set-backs and having been involved with this age group since 2010, I have been very impressed with the maturity and cohesiveness that the boys have exhibited this year in difficult circumstances that in no doubt has contributed to the "team effort" that the boys have displayed on the field week in week out. It would have been easy for a group of 15 year old boys to lose interest in Rugby this year and be distracted by other areas of life, but they haven't, and in fact the events of this year have probably meant a lot of the boys have found more in their rugby than they have previously.

So what a year it was for the boys and by far their most competitive yet:

- the boys achieved 6 wins out of 9 (66% win rate);
- the boys scored 255 points and only conceded 132 points across the season. That is a positive differential of 123 points for the season along with an average of 28 points scored by the boys each game and an average of 14 points scored against the boys each game over the season. That is a first for the boys across each of those categories at Mosman;
- for 7 out of 9 games the opposition have scored 2 tries or less against the boys;
- the boys have been consistent with their Home and Away efforts 3/5 wins Away and 3/4 wins at Rawson; and
- finally, other than for 10 minutes in the 2nd half against Chatswood (where the boys were actually 19-17 up), the margin in defeat has only been between 5-12 points.

The Most Improved Player for the year was awarded to Fraser Wait. The Most Valuable Player was awarded to Hamish Long.

Finally, a big thank you to Lawrance Hunting for coaching the boys again this year. Building off the foundations he instilled into the boys in 2019, the boys took their rugby game to the next level in 2020. It is clear that the boys have managed to find out what it means to play for their team mates as well as to rally around each other when the chips are down. Lawrance has been the driving factor for this resilience which has been demonstrated by the positive results experienced by the boys in 2020.

Finally, MJRC hasn't had an U16 team in its own right for many years now. Hopefully based on the positive rugby experience in 2020 the boys will return to Rawson in 2021 to play for the mighty Mosman Whales. I wish all of those that cannot return in 2021 the very best for their future successes both on the rugby pitch as well as for their future endeavours. Hopefully some of the lessons learned and enjoyment experienced at MJRC carries through to later years. For those returning in 2021 - see you next year!

Our annual rivals for The Battle of the (Spit) Bridge, ironically not contested in 2020, had room so our boys threw their lot in and we had a new joint venture with Vikings.
